FOLLOWING THE LORD

51 years ago last Tuesday I found myself rather nervously entering the novitiate of the Society of Jesus; I felt that I should not be at all surprised if the Jesuits were to throw me out more or less then and there and I be back at home within days. So far it seems that they have not found me out. However I did indeed find myself back home inside a week, in the following entirely unexpected circumstances. September 14th, feast of the Holy Cross, took place in that year on a Monday; on the Thursday, my father had a serious heart attack, rushing for a train back to Bath, from which he died on the following Saturday. So it was that on that day, September 19th, and 51 years ago today. I found myself indeed back home with the family that I had left just five days earlier, with one important and central person painfully missing, and the rest of us in baffled disarray. I will not talk about the sadness, but it was there, and cast its shadows over many subsequent years. It was not that I lost belief in God or became uncertain about my calling; it was more that something of a pillar had gone from my life.

Much later, however, my novice-master said to me that "your father's death was the making of your vocation", and that certainly gave me pause for thought. One thing that did not occur to me until many years later was that when my father had a previous heart attack, ten years or so earlier, I was a boy of 12 or 13; and I must have taken it aboard that it was potentially mortal. For I remember praying at that time that he would live until I could look after the family; at that age, my presumption was that, as the eldest son, I should go into the family firm. And that was how I understood the idea of "looking after the family" at that age. As it turned out, however, it was my next brother down who entered the firm, for which he was ideally, brilliantly, suited; but, years later, as I say, as a religious and later a priest I was able to "look after the family" in entirely unexpected ways. So that prayer had been answered, and it was a long time before I realised it.

And what does this say to you, as you contemplate the readings that we are to hear on this coming Sunday? For my story is of no use unless it speaks to you of the God who is moving and calling in your life. The first thing that we are invited to notice is that if we follow the Lord, we are quite likely to encounter resistance and opposition. For the first reading is written for those (like us, perhaps?) who felt a bit culturally inferior in the brilliant civilisation that was Alexandria in Egypt; they are meant to be encouraged and given hope that their Jewish (like our Christian) heritage had a great deal to offer, after all. Not only that, but we are allowed to eavesdrop on the opponents of the just, as they plot to "get" the virtuous man. When the early Christians read that passage, of course, they will have thought it was Christ to the life (and Death, of course).

The Letter of James, which has been teaching us so entertainingly in these last few weeks, is likewise aware of the possibility of our experiencing opposition, and so it speaks of "wars and battles" and the need to pray.

You see the difficulty is that we are all too likely to meet opposition; and our task is to recognise that God is always somewhere there in the story, and our task is, as Jesuits (and others) learn in the Spiritual Exercises of St Ignatius, that of "finding God in all things".

And that is what we hear in today's gospel, the second of the three Passion Predictions that structure the second half of Mark's gospel. As always, the disciples hardly understand a word of what Jesus is saying, and we hear them squabbling about which of them is "Mr Big". That of course has nothing to do with what Jesus has been telling them about his Cross and Resurrection. Then they must be reminded of the things that really matter, as Jesus reminds them of the importance of children. Jesus was *always* able to "find God in all things"

There is both sadness and joy in listening to the calling of the Lord; and I wish all of you the happiness of finding your vocation today.
