THE PRACTICE OF DISCERNMENT

You may have heard that just at present we Jesuits are being invited to reflect on our four Universal Apostolic priorities, which have been given us after a good deal of prayerful reflection, and warmly endorsed by the Holy Father. In consequence we have decided to share with you something of these four priorities over the next four Sundays. You might like to reflect on your experience in attending this beautiful church, and just examine what we do in this parish, whether we are in fact living out these priorities, and whether you have any suggestions for ways in which we might do it better.

Our first priority, then, (and Pope Francis insisted that this was absolutely basic to all our deliberations and all our ministry) is that we are to show the way to God, through the Spiritual Exercises and the practice of discernment. You will notice that there is already a good deal of this going on, with spiritual direction, and perhaps in sermons and religious services, which should be pointing the way to God if we get it right.

Perhaps we might use this Sunday's readings a way into this question. In the first reading, we listened in some astonishment as the young King Solomon prayed for the gift of wise discernment; there is a lesson for us here as he is explicitly excluding from his prayer any mention of power or wealth or health, or even precious stones; because, as he argues, all these come to those who have the gift of wise discernment. We have, you see, to get our priorities right, to have a grip on the things that really matter.

And wise discernment is what is on offer in the psalm for today, which asks God for the grace "to count our days and so gain a heart of wisdom". But like many of us the singer is perhaps not convinced that God is really listening, for he cries "Come back O Lord - how long"; and he is looking for a calculus of joy to balance the of misfortune. Perhaps he vears has fully understood the business of discernment, of listening to God; but he is getting there, and asks for the grace, which Jesuits pray for in the Spiritual Exercises, of "finding God in all things" For he asks: "Let your work be evident to your servants". And his next prayer is one that any of us could make; "Let the Lord's favour be upon us – establish the works of our hands upon us". There is a profound recognition here, which Jesuits and all the rest of us must share, that it is in the end God who is in charge; and any success that we may have is never our doing, but the work of God in us. There is wisdom here.

And there is wisdom, too, in our second reading, from the great work of theology that is the Letter to the Hebrews; it is not easy, but if you keep in mind that for our author it is quite simply that Jesus is the Real Thing, then it makes sense. If we can get that right, then we are on the way to doing serious discernment, finding our way to God. So he speaks of "God's living word", where what matters is God's power, not our own. Then he uses a powerful metaphor on which we shall do well to reflect, "God's word is living and active, sharper than a *two-edged sword*…all creation is open to it: everything is stripped bare and vulnerable to his gaze".

Then the gospel offers us two failures to discern. There is, first and most obvious, that of the one whom we may call the "bumptious pietist"; and, secondly that of Peter. The bumptious pietist, as we heard, came bouncing up to Jesus, and genuflected to Jesus, demanding to know how to inherit eternal life. Now that is a wrong question, utterly undiscerning; for the important question is none of these but "What is God doing in the story?". So we listen, perhaps a bit puzzled, as Jesus apparently rejects being called "good", on the grounds that only God can be called that; once again, you see, the focus is on God. Then he is told to keep the commandments, significantly, perhaps, not those which deal with our attitudes to God, but those which talk about how we are to behave towards our fellow humans, to which Jesus adds "do not defraud"; perhaps he thought that was something to which the bumptious pietist needed to pay some attention. Perhaps his call to discernment required him to relieve himself of the distractions of great wealth. Only if we get rid of irrelevant seductions can we discern the call of God.

And so to the second failure to discern; this (as so often) is that of Jesus' disciples, who are shaken to the core about the call to poverty; and this increases considerably when Jesus makes the alarming remark that "it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the Kingdom of God". They and we are stunned at this, and Peter sums up their failure to discern by asking, in effect, "What's in it for us, then?" Discerning comes to us only when we recognise that there are obstacles on our journey to God which God invites us to clear away.

Are there ways in which we might do a better job of showing the way to God through the Spiritual Exercises and discernment?
