ACCOMPANYING THE YOUNG TOWARDS A HOPE-FILLED FUTURE

Regular readers of the Farm Street weekly newsletter will know that during October our reflections are focussing on each of the Society of Jesus' four "Universal Apostolic Preferences" in turn. This week we have reached the third, to "accompany the young to a hope-filled future".

The Society is no stranger to work with young people and Farm Street is no exception. Our ministry to young adults aged between 18 and 35 flourishes, with upwards of 100 attending their mass at 7.00pm each Sunday evening. Our catechetical programme prepares children and teenagers to receive the sacraments of Holy Communion and Confirmation. We also prepare many couples for marriage and for the baptism of their children, and most of them are young adults.

But the work with the young which the Society around the world is most associated with is that which takes place in our schools, colleges and universities, work which I have been associated with for much of my life as a priest. Arguably, these places are more distinctively Jesuit now than they were in the 1960's and 1970's when I was a student. I see our educational work as being marked by three features in particular.

In 1973, the Jesuit superior general, Fr Pedro Arrupe, spoke to Jesuit alumni at a conference in Valencia in Spain and identified educating "agents of change" who were "men and women for others" as our goal. This led to numerous projects which gave students opportunities to serve the poor and to understand the causes of poverty and injustice and to the creation of new educational projects specifically aimed to help the poor and marginalised. There is the "Fe y Alegria" network in Latin America which provides a vocational education to more than one million students and the innovative "Cristo Rey" schools in the United States and Canada which aim to prepare for university students for poorer backgrounds whose potential might otherwise not be realised.

During Fr Peter Hans Kolvenbach's 25 years as superior general, I took there to be an emphasis on education "men and women of faith who were men and women for others" in response to the growing secularism of many countries in the western world, including our own. Indeed, for me, nurturing the faith of young people is the major challenge facing the Church in the UK today. This emphasis led to a renewed focus on the content and quality of religious education and the opportunities students could be given to encounter Christ and form a personal relationship with him which would then find its expression not least in the service of those who had least.

Fr Kolvenbach's successor, Fr Adolfo Nicolás, in an address to the leaders of Jesuit universities in Mexico City in 2010, lamented what he called the "globalisation of superficiality", a product of the easy access to knowledge provided by the internet and the social media. He called on our schools and colleges to form as well "men and women of depth", not only "intellectual depth", important though that is, but the kind of depth that comes with skills in making discerning choices.

Though I am no longer working in a school or university on a daily basis, I am a school governor, and, in that role, I have recently been struck by the enthusiasm of our school leaders for promoting Jesuit education and for holding on to this distinctive identity at a time of yet more government imposed structural change.

But this third apostolic preference adds one more characteristic. We are to "accompany" young people, to walk alongside them and care for them as individuals. Such accompaniment shows them what so many need to know, in particular the many who have a fractured sense of self, that they are personally worthwhile, cared for and bothered about. This in turn can give them a renewed confidence in themselves which, as I see it, is one of the keys to realising that "hope-filled future" with which this third apostolic preference is concerned.

The Universal Apostolic Preferences are the fruit of a worldwide process of discernment lasting almost two years. All Jesuits were invited to take part and in addition our mission partners. It concluded with a confirmation from Pope Francis in a special meeting with Fr General Arturo Sosa.

The Preferences give a horizon, a point of reference to the whole Society of Jesus. They capture our imaginations and awaken our desires. They unite us in our mission. The new Preferences are four areas vital for our world today. The Society of Jesus will pay special attention to them in the next ten years.

During this month of October, we invite you to learn more as each weekend the newsletter article is devoted to 1 of the apostolic preferences. In addition the particular preference that weekend will find a place in the homilies. The plan is as follows:
