Churches Together in Westminster AGM

This will be held on Monday 23rd January 2023 at Methodist Central Hall, SW1H 9NH. It will be followed by a panel discussion, titled 'Coping with a Torn Safety Net: The Church's Response to Increasing Need'. The panel will include Hannah Rich from the Theos Think Tank, along with speakers from Central London Catholic Churches, The Salvation Army, St Martin-in-the-Fields, The American International Church, and Hinde Street Methodist Church.

Assisted Suicide Inquiry

The House of Commons Health and Social Care Committee has launched an inquiry into assisted suicide and is inviting individual members of the public and interested organisations to comment, and also to suggest what actions might be helpful for the debate. We have been asked by the bishops to invite you all to participate in this enquiry.

Assisted suicide presents profound dangers to public safety and the common good, and so it is crucial that as many people as possible engage with the Parliamentary Inquiry and oppose the introduction of assisted suicide into UK law. It is especially important that those who respond should oppose the idea of a 'Citizens' Assembly' or referendum on this issue, as these are easily abused to try to legalise assisted suicide.

"All life has inestimable value even the weakest and most vulnerable, the sick, the old, the unborn and the poor, are masterpieces of God's creation, made in his own image, destined to live forever, and deserving of the utmost reverence and respect." (*Pope Francis, July 28, 2013*)

"More and more lonely elderly people exist in big cities, even in situations of serious illness and close to death. In such situations, the pressure of euthanasia is felt, especially when a utilitarian vision of the person creeps in. In this regard, I take this opportunity to reaffirm once again the firm and constant ethical condemnation of every form of direct euthanasia, in accordance with the Church's centuries-old teaching." (*Pope Benedict XVI*, *February 25 2008*)

The Catholic Church is clear that we can never assist in taking the life of another, even if they request it. Our call is one for assistance in living and not assistance in committing suicide.

Expanding the tent continuing the synodal journey

As we begin a new calendar year, we can look to moving forward with the synodal process in the Catholic Church.

Many of us have already participated in listening to each other by filling in questionnaires, or maybe attending a group, and responses have been gathered and sent to the Westminster diocese.

Many of you will know that the Vatican has produced the Document for the Continental Stage, which summarizes views from the Church around the world so far and the Pope has extended the synod until the end of 2024.

The theme of the continental document is centred around a quote from Isaiah 54:2, 'enlarge the space of your tent'. We are invited to use the metaphor of the tent to think about the church today. We are asked to consider in what ways the "tent' may need to expand, and what will be required to accommodate this.

The tent seems a helpful metaphor, because any structure relying on fabric, ropes, and poles will require the correct amount of tension to hold it up; too much tension and the fabric may tear, whilst reducing the tension may cause the structure to begin to collapse in on itself, thus reducing available capacity.

These writings would seem to be encouraging all of us in the church, laity and clergy, to continue to participate in this process of gathering and listening to each other with particular reference to using prayer and allowing the Holy Spirit to emerge and guide the way forward.

On a practical note, here at Farm Street we are organising an integrated Day of Reflection, Discernment and Discussion on Saturday, the 21st of January. This will be held in the Aula Magna on the 2nd floor at 114 Mount Street between 10am and 4 pm. We are aiming to gather as many people as possible from all parts of our congregations. The vision for this day is that people can gather from all parts of our parish church, and those involved with Jesuit young adults ministry, LGBT Catholics Westminster, and homeless services. We are aiming to embody 'journeying together' and will gather the views of all who attend on January 21st to be represented at the European continental stage assembly in Prague in February 2023. 2. After having read and prayed with the Continental Stage Document, what substantial tensions or divergences emerge as particularly important in your continent's perspective? Consequently, what are the questions or issues that should be addressed and considered in the next steps of the process?

Jesuits in Britain Anniversary

The Jesuits in Britain will mark the **400**th **anniversary** of the establishment of the British Province with a Mass on **21**st **January 2023** at the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Farm Street. The Mass will be celebrated by **His Eminence Cardinal Vincent Nichols, the Archbishop of Westminster**, and the homily will be given by the Provincial Superior of the British Jesuits, Father Damian Howard SJ.

The Mass will take place at 12 noon and will be followed by a reception in the Arrupe Hall at 114 Mount Street, next door to the Church of the Immaculate Conception. The Jesuits would be delighted to see you, and those wishing to attend are asked to email frobb@jesuit.org.uk by 10th January 2023, including any special dietary requirements you may have if you wish to attend the reception.

The Mass will mark 400 years since the establishment of a Province structure in England and Wales. The Jesuit mission is still flourishing today in Britain, with the Jesuits' pastoral, intellectual, educational, spiritual and social activities all thriving. From parishes, including Farm Street, to schools, universities (Campion Hall in Oxford), university chaplaincies (in Birmingham, Oxford and Manchester and Imperial College London), through to social centres such as JRS-UK (the Jesuit Refugee Service in Britain) and Jesuit Missions, the Jesuits continue to inspire people to work for the good of others. They have embraced new technology too; whether it's the popular prayer app Pray-As-You-Go, the wide range of spiritual and theological courses delivered online or at centres such as the London Jesuit Centre, St Beuno's and the Ignatian Spirituality Jesuit Centre in Glasgow, the Jesuits and those who work with them continue to follow the example of their founder St Ignatius of Loyola, who sought to find God in everything.
