

WALKING THE SYNODAL PATH AT FARM STREET CHURCH

Pope Francis has launched a worldwide process of listening and discerning, a 'synodal pathway' from October 2021-2023.

Synodal means 'journeying together'. The Pope is inviting the entire Church to reflect on a theme that is decisive for its life and mission.

This is one of the most exciting developments in the Roman Catholic church since the Second Vatican Council.

There will be three types of synodal conversations:

- 1. Listening Events with Area Bishops
 One to One Area Listening Events
 Paired Listening Events for Young Adults, Ethnic
 Chaplaincies, Social Justice and Peace
 Network, and School Leaders
- 2. Online Listening Events for those who cannot attend locally.

The diocese is inviting groups and individuals to join in area, parish, and online conversations. Please look for the details online at details at www.rcdow.org.uk/synod

3. A variety of listening activities in our own Parish. Father Dominic has asked me to be the parish representative for the synodal process, and I have been spending time considering how best to serve in this role. We have started by gathering a team of individuals and have representatives who will be putting on a range of events.

At Farm Street there will be different activities, which we hope will gather the views of as many people within our church as possible, those perhaps on the margins or considering getting involved, and those connected with the church through volunteering or other projects.

Some of us in the parish identify with particular groups – it may be that you go to one of the masses regularly, you may attend on weekdays, occasionally, or at festivals and events.

You may be somebody who has popped into the church to look at the art, to pray or to spend time in our peaceful and contemplative environment. You may be a volunteer or a client/guest of the various services for homeless people that Farm Street is involved with – SVP, homeless hub, visiting the housebound.

Or be part of the ever-growing on-line community.

The parish also has connections with CLC, catholic schools through young people and their parents and universities and colleges.

Of course, many will consider themselves part of more than one group or none.

Some of the events/activities are already planned:

Steven Fachada, our pastoral council chair is arranging some listening sessions for anyone who attends the 11 am congregation.

Steven will publicise these once he has confirmed the details.

Similarly, Debbie Martin and I will be arranging listening sessions for people who attend the 9:30 Mass and we had our first session on Sunday, the 2nd January 2022 in the Arupe Hall after Mass.

There will be sessions for altar servers, led by one of the young people in Farm Street.

Pauline Mercieca is arranging events for anyone who identifies as over 65, and this includes herself, and she will she aimed to have the first event before Christmas. She will be facilitating a session on 17th January 2022, and further details will follow from Pauline about this.

The younger adults who attend the 7pm mass are planning events.

Leninha Assis, our catechist, will be gathering the views of the younger children and their parents.

Leslie Giltz is leading on an on-line survey to access all who have given their email contact to the Parish, and those who access the on-line masses.

ENTRY

After the Lord was baptized, the heavens were opened, and the Spirit descended upon him like a dove, and the voice of the Fathered thundered: This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.

RESPONSE

Bless the Lord, my soul! Lord God, how great you are.

ACCLAMATION

Someone is coming, said John, someone greater than I. He will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and with fire.

COMMUNION

Behold the One of whom John said: I have seen and testified that this is the Son of God.



ANGELUS ADDRESS

Poday we are celebrating the Feast of the Lord's Baptism, which concludes the Christmas season. The Gospel describes what happens on the bank of the Jordan. At the time that John the Baptist baptizes Jesus, the heavens opened. "When he came up out of the water", St Mark writes, "immediately he saw the heavens opened" (1:10). This brings to mind the dramatic supplication of the Prophet Isaiah: "O that thou wouldst rend the heavens and come down" (Is 64:1). This invocation was granted at the event of the Baptism of Jesus. Thus ended the time that the "heavens were closed", which had symbolized the separation between God and man as a consequence of sin. Sin distanced us from God and broke the bond between heaven and earth, thereby determining our misery and failures in our lives. The opening of the heavens indicate that God granted his grace in order that the land bear its fruit (cf. Ps 85[84]: 11-12). This is how the earth became the dwelling place of God among men, and it is possible for each one of us to meet the Son of God, experiencing all of his love and infinite mercy. We are able to encounter Him truly present in the Sacraments, especially in the Eucharist. We are able to recognize Him in the faces of our brothers and sisters, especially in the poor, the sick, the imprisoned, the displaced: they are the living flesh of the suffering Christ and the visible image of the invisible God.

With the Baptism of Jesus, not only do the heavens open, but God speaks once again making *his voice resound*: "This is my beloved Son; with whom I am well pleased" (Mk 1:11). The Father's voice proclaims the mystery that is hidden in the Man baptized by the Forerunner.

Then the *Holy Spirit* descends, in the form of a dove: this allows Christ, the Lord's Consecrated One, to inaugurate his mission, which is our salvation. The Holy Spirit: the great One forgotten in our prayers. We often pray to Jesus: we pray to the Father, especially in the "Our Father"; but we do not often pray to the Holy Spirit, is it true? He is the Forgotten One. And we need to ask for his help, his strength, his inspiration. The Holy Spirit who has wholly animated the life and mystery of Jesus, is the same Spirit who today guides Christian existence, the existence of men and women who call themselves and want to be Christians. To subject our Christian life and mission, which we

have all received in Baptism, to the action of the Holy Spirit means finding the apostolic courage necessary to overcome easy worldly accommodations. Christians and communities who are instead "deaf" to the voice of the Holy Spirit, who urges us to bring the Gospel to the to the ends of the earth and of society, also become "mutes" who do not speak and do not evangelize.

But remember this: pray often to the Holy Spirit, that He help us, give us strength, give us inspiration and enable us to go forward.

May Mary, Mother of God and of the Church, accompany the journey of all of us baptized; may she help us to grow in our love for God and in the joy of serving the Gospel, in order to thereby give full meaning to our life.
