CHRIST THE KING

Today we come very close to the end of the Church's Year, with the extraordinary feast of Christ the King. Now we need to look very carefully at this feast, to make sure that it is not an outbreak of triumphalism. For calling Christ our "King" might be conjuring up an image of a victorious king who could never be defeated, making sure that we are on the winning side; well that is true of course, but our king is one who was unfashionably vulnerable and who died that horrible death. it may be helpful to look at what the readings tell us about this "King" of ours. And the image that they project is that remarkable Old Testament picture of God as our "Shepherd". So in that first reading, the prophet Ezekiel makes it clear that what is expected of such a shepherd, is that he looks after the sheep, rather than using them as a source of money or votes. Because our God Is one who is on the side of the poor and the marginalized; and we may reflect how good it would be if all the politicians of our time were to walk under his banner. Instead, we see them as the reading puts it, "butting the weak sheep with their horns". That is not the kind of Shepherd that is Christ our King.

Inevitably, the psalm for today is that loveliest of all Old Testament songs, "the Lord is my shepherd"; and, once again, we see that "King" does not mean "one who brings us military victory", but that gentle leader who looks after the weak and powerless, even when they "walk in the Valley of the Shadow of Death"; instead, we are invited to reflect on where this King will take us: "green pastures... still waters... paths of righteousness". This is a King who is worth following, as the old year shifts into the new.

Then the second reading, from near the end of Paul's first letter to Corinth, does not really mention the idea of "shepherd"; instead we find a rather different way of looking at the kingship of Christ. In this way of seeing it, the main thing we are invited to watch is the "resurrection of Christ". Here Jesus is described as "the first fruits of the dead", who hands over his Kingdom to God, including the "Last Enemy", which is Death. So the final enemy is to be conquered, and "God will be All in All". That is something that we eagerly await.

In the gospel for today we are back to the idea of "Shepherd". At first it all sounds rather grand, for he is enthroned "in glory, all his angels with him". So it is a demonstration of power; however this "King" has some surprises in store: for one thing, "all the nations shall be gathered before him". Then he will perform the action that you can still see being done at the end of each day in the Judean desert, of separating sheep from goats. Here, however, it is a metaphor for what is expected of the disciples of the "King" whom we are invited to celebrate today. For if we are to be servants of this particular monarch, it turns out that we are not, after all, going to be clad in grand livery and drive around in Rolls-Royces. Instead, this King demands of us that we are to give him food and drink and clothing and visits when he is sick or in prison. Above all, we do not wish to hear from our King those terrible words that "I was hungry, and you gave me nothing to eat; I was thirsty, and you gave me nothing to drink; I was an immigrant, and you failed to gather me in; I had no clothes, and you did not give me anything to wear; I was sick and in prison, and you never visited me". Our King is one who can reasonably demand only the best of us; but we may be taken by surprise when we learn what that implies. Let us end our year with generous service to those whom God most loves; that way we shall indeed be worshipping the Lord as Christ the King.
