BE MERCIFUL AS YOUR FATHER IS MERCIFUL

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, we have a further extract from St Luke's account of Jesus' "Sermon on the Plain".

Two weeks ago, we heard the opening of that sermon in which Jesus taught that a blessed future awaits those who, because they follow him, are poor, hungry and sad. Last week, Jesus told his disciples to love their enemies, to do good to those who hate them, to pray for those who treat them badly, to give their tunic as well to those who ask for their cloak and even to turn the other cheek when slapped in the face.

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, we hear three of the four parables with which Jesus this sermon concludes. The first is about a blind man leading a blindman with the result that both fall into a ditch; the second warns us not to complain about a speck in our brother's eye when there is a plank in our own; the third explains that no sound tree produces rotten fruit.

The Jesuit scripture scholar, Fr Peter Edmonds, has helpfully explained how these three parables relate to the content of the Sermon on the Plain. In the first one, the blind man leading the other is a disciple who ignores the teaching of Jesus which calls for love of enemies and the sharing of possessions with the result that he and the one he leads come to no good. The second, meanwhile, is a warning not to regard the standards of behaviour which Jesus teaches as applying to others only. The third reminds us that that the fruit the Christian should produce is the teaching of the Sermon put into practice. This is what good people produce from the treasure in their hearts.

The fourth parable, which is not included in this Sunday's reading, fits the same pattern. Jesus compares a house built on sand with a house built on the rock. Those who are built on Jesus and his teachings and putting them into practice are those who are firmly and thoroughly established, withstanding all that life throws at them.

Lent begins next Wednesday. Does the Sermon on the Plain tell us how we might make this the season of personal renewal it is meant to be?

The examples which Jesus provides – love your enemies; do good to those who hate you; give your tunic as well to someone who asks for your cloak – are all examples of gratuitous love. They are "gratuitous" in the sense that the other person has done nothing to earn or deserve what we do for him or her. We are to be motivated by love alone. "Be merciful", Jesus tells us in this sermon, "as your Father is merciful". Acting in this way, we are imitating God in his love for us. We can do nothing to deserve or earn his love: God loves because, as St John tells us, "God is love".

One way for us to keep Lent this year might be to include in each day acts of gratuitous kindness: by loving not because of what others can do for us in return, but only for love's sake. We might stop to talk to the man or woman begging at the stop of the steps of the tube station or we can phone or visit the older person down the road and risk getting just a little involved. Perhaps best of all, we can take the initiative, be the first, to reach out a hand in forgiveness to the one who has wronged us. And in doing so, what will we find? That we are not alone in doing this because Jesus has already done the same: he has reached out his hand in forgiveness to you and me when we have wronged him.

Keeping Lent in this way would be for us all, I would suggest, the season of renewal it is meant to be.
