THE SERMON ON THE MOUNT

Last Sunday we continued our reading of Matthew's gospel, with the Beatitudes, that astonishing opening to the Sermon on the Mount, with its remarkable singling out of the people whom Jesus wishes to "congratulate". We shall be having the Sermon read to us every Sunday between then and the beginning of Lent, so it seems worthwhile to say something about that sermon today, to help your prayerful listening to this extraordinary presentation of Jesus' teachings.

Matthew seems to want to draw our attention to this collection, and to others as well. For at the end of each of his five collections of Jesus' teaching, he puts a little marker, as follows (and I invite you to look at each of them in your New Testament):

7:28 "and it happened that when Jesus had finished these words, the crowds were amazed at his teaching" (The Sermon on the Mount)

11:1 "and it happened when Jesus had finished instructing his twelve disciples, he went away from there, to teach and preach in their cities" (The Missionary Discourse)

13:53 "and it happened that when Jesus had finished these parables, he went away from there" (The Parable Discourse)

19:1 "and it happened when Jesus had finished these words, he went away from the Galilee and came to the regions of Judaea, across the Jordan" (the Church Discourse)

26:1 "and it happened that when Jesus had finished all these words, he said to his disciples..." (the Last Discourse).

Do you see how Matthew singles out these discourses? I suspect that he had Mark's gospel open in front of him, and felt that although Mark often referred to Jesus as a teacher, and to one of his principal activities as "teaching", he hardly ever actually gives the reader a taste of what he taught.

Of these five "discourses", the best-known is the Sermon on the Mount, which, as I say, we shall be reading on the Sundays leading up to the beginning of Lent. What might you look out for as you listen? Obviously the most striking part is what we call the "Beatitudes", which we heard last Sunday, with that extraordinary singling out of the most unlikely people ("poor in spirit", "mourners", "gentle", "hungry and thirsty for justice", "merciful", "pure in heart", "peacemakers", and "persecuted and...reviled"). This is an electrifying introduction, and you would do well to go back to it sometime this week. But there is more: today's gospel, for example, speaks to us of "salt" and "light", as indispensable qualities for Jesus' disciples. In what way do you think that you are or might be "light" and "salt" to the world around you?

After that the "Sermon" might seem to fall apart slightly, as it becomes difficult to see the structure of it, as we go through the so-called "antitheses": "you have heard it said...but *I* say to you..." where Jesus offers his own take on the Jewish Law. What I should like to

suggest to you is that the Sermon is given its structure by the prayer that comes right at its centre, what we call the "Lord's Prayer", which is part of Jesus' affirmation of the pillars of Jewish religious practice, almsgiving, prayer and fasting. Here he establishes a clear pattern, a warning to us not to do all these things in order to gain human admiration. Instead we are to do them with our focus entirely on God as Father. So I suggest to you that if you want to find out how this great Sermon hangs together, you draw out the links to the different petitions in the teaching of the remainder of the Sermon. And then remember those links every time that you say the Lord's Prayer. Now the heart of the matter is the great "Fatherhood of God". If you should find yourself reading the Sermon in these coming weeks, I suggest that you count the number of references to "your Heavenly Father" (they start at 5:48).

And finally, you might like to have a look at how the Sermon ends (because that could give us a clue about what is going on). It draws two contrasting pictures, which you will find at 7:24-27. First he mentions those who are attentive disciples: "So everyone who listens to these words of mine and performs them, will be like a wise man, who built his house upon the Rock". Then, by contrast, there is the other category: "those who listen to these words of mine and do not perform them, will be like a foolish man, who built his house on sand", with the inevitable result.

Will you try and read the Sermon on the Mount this week, and try to decide whether you are currently building on sand or on rock?

On the Mystery (and Reality) of the Church 1-day course

Saturday, 18 February 2023

Course overview

What is the Church, exactly? It has certainly been talked about in lots of different ways: as both the 'body' of Christ and the 'bride of Christ'; as a 'perfect society' and as the 'pilgrim people of God'. And people have very different encounters with church: vibrant, life-restoring encounters; dreary, mundane encounters; sometimes even terrifying, destructive encounters. Each week, millions of Christians profess their belief in 'one, holy, catholic and apostolic church' - but what does it mean to say that the church is 'holy', when is it sinful, or 'one' when it is divided and at odds with itself? This course introduces 'ecclesiology' - the theology of

Church - in view of these, and other questions. We ask what Church is, what it should be, and what it has to do with the other essential elements of Christian belief. Participants will explore some of the most influential figures that have shaped recent ecclesiology, read some key theological texts, and reflect on how to connect these ideas with their own experience of, and encounters with the Church.

Why Believe? Defending and Explaining the Faith

In this course we take a hard look at some of the most difficult questions that are asked of the Christian faith, so as to think about it more clearly, explain it more persuasively and defend it more effectively. For example, there seem to be some bad reasons to believe in God, but are there any really good reasons? And even if there are some good reasons to support belief in God, aren't there also lots of reasons not to believe? What about the thought that belief in God is irrelevant to the most important things in our lives, anyway? Can't people be 'good without God'? Why bother trying to resolve questions that lie beyond the limits of our understanding?

In each week of the course we take a look at one problematic question or an objection to Christian belief, and see what kinds of response might usefully be put forward in response.
