THE MEANING OF LIFE

There is a cleaned up version of the story told by the comedians Peter Cook and Dudley Moore which goes: “I had that philosopher Bertrand Russell in the back of my cab and I said to him, “what is it all about then?”” and, would you believe it, he didn’t know”. Today’s readings raise that question. We see two very different answers to question of what life is about.

The first answer we get is suggested by Job in the first reading. On this view life is worthless, just drudgery. There is no point to it. Life is something to be endured. Perhaps there are times in our lives when we have felt like Job, times when it has been difficult to see purpose and meaning in our lives.

Our Gospel does not address the question directly but it paints a very different picture. It is full of life and enthusiasm. Jesus is extremely busy, preaching and curing the sick. At long last he is able to get some time before the day begins to go off and pray. When the disciples find him he tells them there is even more to do. “Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came”. Jesus knows what his life is about and he is keen to carry out what he came to do. We see the same thing in St. Paul in the second reading from the letter to the Corinthians. He is called to preach the Gospel and that is what he must do. Job talks about life a meaningless slavery, but Paul says he has made himself a slave of everyone in order to win some for Christ.

The contrasting pictures lead us to ask what our lives are about. For many of our contemporaries life must ultimately seem like that of Job. If they are fortunate there may perhaps be distractions and enjoyments, but in the end, no real meaning. More positively, others are like Simon’s mother-in-law. She finds meaning for her life in serving others, especially her family. No sooner has she been cured of her than she gets busy preparing a meal for Simon and his friends. This way of finding meaning in service is much closer to Jesus and Paul. Worthwhile, though this is there is another step to finding true meaning. What is the meaning of our service, what lies behind it? There is something even beyond family ties. This comes from faith.

Sheer business can keep us going. That can be true in whatever we are doing. That is especially true when that business involves serving others. Even so, there is a danger we can fall in the Job’s way of thinking, even if our activity is of the most noble

kind. We can find ourselves asking, “What is the point?” Is that business really producing anything lasting?” A true sense of meaning comes from keeping our eyes fixed on God. Jesus decision to go on to the other towns after spending time in prayer to his Father. For Paul it is the mission he has received from God. When we feel life is pointless or that service is unfruitful we need to follow the example of Jesus. We need to take time to be with God, to renew that relationship which gives meaning to our lives and our service.

To return to the story, in practice, Bertrand Russell might well have said that the question was meaningless. That, however, depends on very a restricted view of meaning and this is not an article about linguistic philosophy.

Suspension of Public Worship

Following a consultation led by the Parish Pastoral Council we have decided that, in the interests of public safety and following the directive of both the Mayor of London and the Prime Minister that people stay at home and use public transport only for essential travel, public Masses will be suspended as of Friday 22nd January until the critical situation in London regarding the possibility of COVID and its new variants’ infection improves.

The church will now be open from 11am – 5:30pm (on Sunday from 12:30pm) with adoration of the Blessed Sacrament until 4pm. There will be two livestreamed Masses Monday to Saturday at 10am and 6pm (on Saturday the Vigil Mass of Sunday) and on Sunday 11am Solemn Latin and 6pm in English with music.

Face Covering Update

‘Face coverings will be mandatory in Places of Worship from Saturday 8th August 2020. All those who are attending churches must wear a face covering unless they are exempt from doing so. This is for the good of all who gather in the Church for Mass [or for private prayer] as it is an enclosed public space where there are people from differing households who they do not normally meet.’ (*Statement issued by the Bishops’ Conference*).
