# THE SEASON OF WAITING

When I went to live in the United States more than thirty years ago to begin my theology studies in preparation for ordination, I was surprised to find that in some churches the liturgical colour for Advent wasn't the familiar purple, but rather a dark blue.

When I asked about this, some pointed out that in the Catholic Church before the Reformation, blue as a liturgical colour had been common. Others explained that a dark blue represents a time of waiting, which may be thought more appropriate for Advent than purple, which represents a time of penance. After all, in Advent we do a good deal of waiting. In the first two weeks or so, we wait for the second coming of the Lord. Then we wait to celebrate his first coming in the stable in Bethlehem. We wait too for his coming to us each day: in the conversations we have and in the people we meet.

I have found myself thinking a good deal about "waiting" over the past few weeks, ever since I made my annual retreat in our community house in Boscombe, near Bournemouth. On one of the bookshelves in the recreation area, I came across a book by the Redemptorist priest Fr Denis McBride called "Waiting on God"\*. If you come across it, do read it. I was so taken with what Fr Denis had to say in the first two chapters, I thought I'd share a few of his ideas with you since "waiting" is clearly a significant theme in the Advent season which we begin this Sunday. I only hope I can do his ideas justice.

For many people, Fr Denis says, waiting is a complete waste of time: it's the empty landscape between where we are and where we want to be symbolised by the doctor's "waiting room". Here time is put on hold. It's a place where nothing happens since whatever is happening is happening somewhere else. Waiting reminds us that we are not in charge, and we often don't like that. Indeed, waiting in traffic jams, supermarkets checkout queues, bank cash points, are all hotspots for

In our society, Fr Denis points out, there's a direct correlation between status and waiting, since the more important you are, the less time you must wait. The people who always have to wait are the poor, be it, we might add, in the job centre, at the food bank or in line at the post office waiting for benefits.

He quotes the French philosopher and critic Roland Barthes who claims, interestingly, that "waiting" and "love" are very close. "Am I in love?" Yes, since I am waiting. You will always wait for the one you love. We know how important it is in both a family and religious community, to spend time together, to wait together.

This line struck me as well: "I wait because I have not given up the habit of hoping". Which brings us to the patriarch Abraham, our father in faith, and his wife Sarah. They waited and longed for a child for decades. Abraham was 75 and Sarah ten years younger when Abraham was called and promised a son. Ten years later, there was still no sign of one and he was getting

older. He decided to help God out and he married Hagar, his wife's servant. But when she got pregnant, God let him know that wasn't what he promised. Sarah would give him a son, and for that Abraham had to wait another 15 years.

Abraham and Sarah waited. They held on to the dream God had for them. They teach us that waiting in hope, believing in God's dream for us, is no squandering of time but "hallowing time". In that time of waiting, we are being formed. Waiting is our formation and what God does in us while we are waiting is as important as what we wait for. Waiting is not just passing the time, until we get what we want, waiting is the process of becoming that which God wants us to be. We need to be like Sarah and Abraham to trust in God that good will emerge from this in time.

Here are some words of the Swiss theologian Paul Tillich which Fr Denis quotes: "Although waiting is not having, it is also having. The fact that we wait for something shows that in some way we already possess it. Waiting anticipates that which is not yet real. If we wait in hope and patience, the power of that for which we wait is already effective within us. He who waits in absolute seriousness is already grasped by that for which he waits. He who waits in patience has already the power of that for which he waits."

With thoughts such as these in mind, we can begin the season of Waiting. Still better, why not make Fr Denis' book your Advent reading?
