ADVENT THOUGHTS

Quite suddenly today we find ourselves erupting into the wonderful season of Advent. And the first thing that must be said about it is that Advent is not Christmas, even though it was back in August that you saw the first advertisement to book for your Christmas Dinner, (and

those Christmas illuminations on Oxford Street have been blazing for some while now. For us, though, it is not yet Christmas, but a sober time of preparing for the Coming (Adventus in Latin) of Jesus. There are of course three such comings: his first coming, God's Enfleshment, or Incarnation; then there is the "Second Coming", at the end of time, when we come to the predestined end; about that, though it is clearly expected in the whole of the New Testament, there really is not very much that we can say. Finally, there is the third coming, which is our individual encounter with Jesus; and this might be at any time. What is essential here is that we be on the alert for the signs of his presence, and that we build a profound relationship with him. Without such a relationship, it is hard to make sense of life.

So how are we to prepare? Well, the Church gives us some clues in the shape of the extraordinarily rich readings that we are offered in the four weeks that lie ahead, reminding us that we have not got there yet. The readings are different in each week of Advent, and roughly what you might say is that in the first week we are invited to reflect on "Healing for the Broken"; and you will notice how the readings for the week touch on that theme. Then the readings in Week Two offer a "Vision of the Future". The readings for Week 3 might be given the umbrella title of "Hope for what is to come", which is not quite the same as Week 2. Finally, the fourth week of Advent offers "A glimpse of God's plan". And in that week, of course, from December 17th onwards, the church sings the "Great O" antiphons at Evening Prayer: O Sapientia, O Adonai, O Radix Jesse, O Clavis David, O Oriens, O Rex Gentium. O Emmanuel, as a way of guiding our prayer for each day. What I suggest that you might like to do is look in advance at the readings for each Sunday; you might find it interesting to think how you would reach on those readings next Sunday (and perhaps compare that with what you hear from the pulpit on the day!). Or, to go even deeper into the mystery, why not read the readings for each weekday on the night before, and use them to guide your prayer? You might

perhaps turn in prayer to the Lord sometimes and ask "Why did you say that? What is the message for me today?". This can be a very rich way of getting the deepest possible understanding of the Advent time.

And one last thing about this wonderful season: it is a sombre time, when we wear purple, the colour of mourning. We should take that quite seriously; for "out there", the sellers are inducing us to buy things that we do not really want, at prices we cannot really afford. Out there, they are all dressed in gold, the colour of rejoicing. Our rejoicing, however, does not start properly until Christmas Day, when Christ will be born for us. Whereas the commercial Christmas ends abruptly on Boxing Day, which is when the advertisements suddenly switch to selling summer holidays. Meanwhile you and I are invited to go deeper into the mystery of Christmas, with the "Twelve Days" that take us up to the feast of the Epiphany. Then the second part of Christmas goes up to the Baptism of Jesus, after which we are plunged back into the green vestments and dour moods of "Ordinary Time". But if that is too much for you, there are places (including the City of Rome, so I am informed) where Christmas only comes to an end on February 2nd, the feast of the Purification. So there is room to expand your Christmas; but only if you take Advent seriously.

May I wish you a very happy Advent?
