CARRY NO PURSE

On Monday, 20 June, two Jesuits were murdered in Mexico. Fr Javier Campos Morales was 79 and Fr Joaquín César Mora Salazar was 80. They worked at the Cerocahui mission station, one of the oldest Jesuit missions in the country, located in the pine clad remote mountainous area of northern Mexico.

The region is one of the poorest in Mexico and home to indigenous people. It is a major drug producing area, controlled in large part not so much by the government and the security forces but by the drug producers, by organised crime. Violence is endemic. A statement from the Jesuits in Mexico said that "everyday men and women are arbitrarily deprived of life, as are murdered brothers were today".

According to the Mexican president, the priests were killed by gunmen pursuing another man who sought sanctuary in the mission church. When that man ran away from the gunman, he was shot dead. When the Jesuits came to his help, they too were shot at close range. Their bodies were then taken away by the gunmen but have since been returned.

One member of my Jesuit community is a Mexican. Father Luis Orlando told us that the two murdered priests had been well prepared to serve in the area, learning the language of the people whom they served and lived amongst for many years. Now they suffered the same fate as too many of those whom they might have called their parishioners.

I greatly admire Joaquín and Javier, these Jesuit brothers of mine. I admire the way in which year after year they continued to minister to their people despite the danger of doing so in an area controlled by organised crime. Their lives and their deaths give eloquent witness to their belief in Jesus and their confidence that he has conquered even death itself.

I will think of them this Sunday as I read the words of Jesus in the Gospel. As he sends out his disciples, "like lambs among wolves", to continue and expand his mission, he tells them to "carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals". The disciples were not only to continue Jesus' work, but they were also to do that work in the way he did it. They were to live and preach in poverty depending on God alone, just as Jesus lived in poverty and depended on his Father

alone. In this way, their work would be fruitful.

Joaquín and Javier evidently took Jesus at his word and chose his way of poverty and dependence. This, I suspect, enabled them to "accompany" those whom they served in a true sense, not as their superiors so much as their fellow-travellers, their friends and brothers.

What else can they example do for us but encourage us, each in his or her own way, to follow Jesus along the way.
