DISCIPLESHIP

Today's gospel is a very interesting one (Matthew 11:25-30); it is sandwiched in Matthew's text between, on the one hand, Jesus' stern rebuke of the cities in which he had wrought miracles that have gone quite unremarked ("it will be better for Sodom on the day of judgement than for you"), and, on the other hand (11:20-24), his dealing with the Pharisees, who, like too many religious people down the ages, criticise Jesus' disciples, and therefore, of course, Jesus himself, for not being sufficiently observant of the Sabbath regulations (12:1-8). Jesus never invites us to be "rule-bound".

In our gospel, Matthew has Jesus "replying", or responding, to the situation in which he finds himself; and what are you supposed to do in this situation? You always turn back to God, whom characteristically Jesus always addresses as "Father". (It is of course Matthew's Gospel that gives us the "Our Father" precisely in the middle of the Sermon on the Mount). In our passage, God is twice addressed in this endearing way. In the first sentence, Jesus is "confessing" to God, and very importantly, addressing his Father as "Lord of heaven and earth"; but this high status does not lead where we might have expected it to. Instead it issues in a very unexpected claim: "you hid these things from the wise and the intelligent and revealed them to infants!" Then he repeats the same form of address: "Yes, Father, for this was your good pleasure". This is followed by a meditation on the relationship of the Father and the Son: "everything has been handed over to me by my Father, and no one knows the Son except the Father". Then it continues, rather as we might have expected: "and no one knows the Son, except the Father". After that, however, it takes an entirely unexpected turn "... and anyone to whom the Son reveals him". That, presumably, is we who are listening to the gospel today. Finally the gospel reading ends with an invitation: "come to me". That sounds delightful enough, until we hear the identity of those to whom the invitation is offered: "you who are weary and heavy burdened". We were certainly not expecting that, but we can only rejoice when we hear the next line, "and I shall give you rest". That presumably means the end of all our slavery.

That sounds all very attractive, but then, it seems, things get rather heavy; for we are invited to take a "yoke". Now a "yoke" is an

ancient symbol of slavery; a defeated army was made to walk symbolically "under the yoke", to indicate that authority had irrevocably passed to the victorious side. It was also, incidentally, the symbol for taking on a rabbi's teaching authority; and we see that Jesus is inviting us to "learn from me" (that word "learn", and its various cognate forms, are frequently used by Matthew to indicate the relationship between Jesus and his disciples). But this teacher is not a slave-master; instead, he says, "I am gentle and lowly in heart"; and we may remember that that word "gentle" appears in the Beatitudes with which Matthew's great composition, the Sermon on the Mount, begins. And we also notice how it all continues: "you will find rest for your souls", which is a quotation from Isaiah. So we find ourselves enchanted by the invitation, and we listen very carefully indeed as Jesus continues his self-description: then, once again, we notice that he is talking about the "yoke": "for my yoke is easy". We feel a bit better as we hear this, and this may be even more so when we reflect that in the original Greek it would have sounded like "my yoke is Christ", which gives a completely different picture. Now the "burden" word appears once more: "and my burden is insignificant" Suddenly we have a very different understanding of what Jesus is about.

What is this gospel saying to you about your discipleship in the coming week?
