# A CALL TO COME INTO THE LIGHT OF THE TRUTH

"Come out into the light", says Jesus to Nicodemus. The one who is in the light may be seen plainly, and in such a way, the Gospel tells us, we see the truth. But how does the Christian respond to that invitation in the midst of today's world, a world in which it's often difficult to know where the truth lies, as the truth is so often manipulated and obscured?

Surely with great difficulty. It's no wonder many end up questioning if the vaccine is safe, the infection rate really is coming down, and if it's really safe to come to church. The answer to all those three is clearly in the affirmative but there is so much fake news out there it is difficult to see the truth. We are indeed beginning to see the light at the end of the long tunnel of the lockdown and, if the majority of us are vaccinated and are still careful, we can look forward to all the things we miss at Farm Street as we sing hymns again, socialise in the Arrupe Hall and in the Gardens, and build a Christian community unfettered from social distancing, sanitising and the computer screen.

But as we begin to see that light emerge in the distance we are also being called to reflect on what we have been learning from this time, where the truth is in that, and what we will take from the experience of this dreadful time to help us respond to the task to rebuild in what Pope Francis is calling this 'change of era'. Pope Francis has been leading us in that reflection over this last year. I for one find his leadership truly inspirational. He sees a world on its knees yearning for a society which is more authentically human, which is more just, where everyone's dignity is respected, where the light of truth shines forth and dispels the darkness.

The Holy Father seems more and more aware of how contemporary culture has obscured the truth. As society becomes more and more polarised and fake news holds us hostage he is calling us to embrace a truth that has been eluding us but truly is out there, revealed to us in the light of Christ's coming and his resurrection, a truth we need to rediscover as central to our faith and to our calling to be missionary disciples. The Christ who dies in agony on the cross, goes into the despair of the tomb, will rise again and herald new life. We are called to bring that Christ to our world and to take the reins of rebuilding his Kingdom.

Lent gives us the opportunity to prepare well for the light of Easter. There is still time to use what is left of

it well. Maybe this year it will be very different for some of us, perhaps many of us. The story of our year may be tinged with sadness, suffering, emotional and mental anguish, perhaps also financial and job worries. The pandemic has dealt cruel blows to so many in society. But it could also be time for looking back to discern how I have been serving him as his disciple so as to look forward to the light of Easter. Where are the areas of my life where I have omitted to witness to the risen Christ I worship each Sunday? That is what it is to repent. To allow God to reignite those parts of my life where gifts have remained unused, potential left untapped, where God wants fruit still to be born through the gift of our very selves where the Risen Christ resides.

This Lent is tough for many of us as this year is so tough for so many of us. But we are called to remember that Lent propels us to Easter. The light at the end of the tunnel can give us hope if we truly do desire to bring Christ and his values to a world which is yearning to rediscover what it is to be an authentically human society built on eternal truths.

# **Encounters with Jesus in Lent**

Farm Street Church and The Grosvenor Chapel are running a joint Lent reflection course titled 'Encounters with Jesus'. This is being held via Zoom at 8pm on six consecutive Wednesdays, beginning on the 24<sup>th</sup> of February and concluding on the 31<sup>st</sup> March. The course will reflect on the encounters with Jesus experienced by people in the Gospels and will use the Spiritual Exercises of St Ignatius of Loyola as a guide.

Each session will consist of 1.) A Brief Introduction, 2.) A Scriptural Reading, 3.) A 20-minute Guided Meditation on the Reading, 4.) Break out rooms to reflect on the Guided Meditation (20 minutes) with Facilitator in each Group 5.) Return to plenary and Final Prayers.

This Wednesday is Week 4, which will focus on the miracle of Jesus healing blind Bartimaeus, as recorded in Mark 10:46-52. The theme for the remaining weeks is:

Week 5: This man was Son of God Mk 15: 33-39 Week 6. Mary at the tomb Jn 20: 11-18

# **Forty Martyrs Exhibition**

Drawing on the Province's extensive collection of papers and relics, it tells the remarkable story of the martyrs with short talks, text, and pictures. #### **Help the Homeless Donation Hub**

During the first Covid 19 lockdown in the Spring 2020, Companions of the Order of Malta and Westminster City Council worked in partnership to start a donation hub for the homeless. The aim was to streamline the donations available and produce a circular network where the necessary supplies were available to support vulnerable individuals being housed in the hotels and hostels and the street population.

35,000 items were sorted and packed at St Joseph's Hall, Brompton Oratory from April to July and then delivered to the homeless. The donation hub opened again in November 2020, and we open to receive donations again.
