GOOD NEWS

We are almost there. We continue to draw from what works, and we leave behind and let go of things that hinder us. And at some point, we cannot avoid noticing a sign, good news for our journey, until it gradually becomes a little bit more real, more tangible. In other words, those small Christmas feasts that come our way in ordinary life. Every time God visits us, it brings on the Christmas flavour. In the face of journeying during Advent season, we need to be realistic and hold on. It is no coincidence that we spoke together last week about perseverance and patience. I continue this week to develop the theme of holding on and expecting the Lord's salvation because all of humanity needs it. We all need to leave behind our evil ways of coping and find ways that best communicate God's splendour in giving us this life.

When we look at the readings to mark the fourth Advent Sunday, they speak of receiving a sign which shows forth the Lord's goodness and no one needs to test it out (cf. Is 7:12). The sign comes directly from God after the King Ahaz refused to seek for a sign of rescue. Instead, God's patience saves us in our circumstances and in time offers us "the Good News that God promised long ago" (Rom 1:2).

So, if we were encouraged up until now to continue to walk the path, this time we are encouraged to do both, keep on walking and look for signs that affirm our progress. God's sign is the Good News of God with us. When Ignatius offers us to pray over the mystery of Incarnation, he exhorts us "to ask for intimate knowledge of our Lord, who has become man for me, that I may love Him more and follow Him more closely." (SpEx 104). In this preparatory prayer, we are to look towards God in Trinity who looks at each one of us -- so many places and people seeking justice and peace (cf. SpEx 102-103) -- and wants to saves us all from self-destruction. Trying this out by recalling my own personal circumstances is a healthy spiritual exercise to bring on the need for salvation and the meaning of Christ becoming man, the true meaning of Christmas festivities. Mathew's Gospel tells the story of Joseph, his looking at signs, his journeying and discernment through his gradual acceptance that God is indeed involved. Joseph is a just man, a man who works honestly, a man who respects his fiancé and someone who remains within the rules of the society in which he lives. And precisely for this man, plans do not go as expected. We too happen to be like Joseph. We try to live as honestly as we can, we pursue our goals and are committed to always doing what we think is right. Yet, unexpected things happen to us leading us to reconsider all of our projects. There are always two alternatives available: to welcome and embrace anything unexpected even at the risk of it all being all too messy, or to neglect and refuse all that life offers,

remaining closed in our schemes and projects and not leaving too much place for God to intervene. Dreams and desires are a good way of following God's signs. Anxieties often trump our or God's plans. But with the name of Jesus on our lips, with love and in a spirit of conversion, we stand a better chance to find the Good News of God with us.

What unexpected event is making its way into my life at the moment and trumps my plans? What do I dream about and what desire do I find in my heart?

Where do I find myself anxious to make a choice?

The Centre is new, and is looking to better meet the needs of the Church and society in general. As we enter the New Year we are considering our future plans and how best to reach out to people.

If you have any ideas about what is needed in the Church and the world, particularly in the areas of Spirituality, Theology and Environment and Social Justice, then please come along if you can to our Ideas Day. We will let you know what we have been doing in the past year or so and listen to you about what you think would be good to develop.

Although the event is free, we ask you to sign up so we know how many people to cater for.

Race and Theology

Starting on Tuesday 24th January and running every week until Tuesday 21st February. 12 noon to 1pm via Zoom. Throughout the long history of the Church, Christian sacred texts have been used as a way of promoting both racial justice and racial discrimination. During the earliest period of European colonial history, Christian theology was co-opted by those who sought to provide an ethical warrant for genocide. It was also used by those who sought to defend the dignity of indigenous people. During the nineteenth century, Christian theology was used by those who wished to defend the practice of slavery but also by abolitionists. In the twentieth century, white nationalist groups vaunted their Christian identity but Christian thought and texts were also used by those who fought against racism. This course explores the complex interaction between Christian theology and race over the course of two thousand years of Church history.
