ST GEORGE: A SAINT FOR OUR TIMES

On Tuesday this week, we shall be celebrating the feast of St George, Patron saint of England. He is mentioned in the context of England as early as the 8th century, by St Bede, that great English saint and historian, as well as in various other ancient documents; and there are dedications of English churches to him as early as the 10th century. Devotion to St George in England seems to go back at least as far as the Crusades, where English soldiers revered him as a warrior saint, and brought devotion to him back from Palestine. His banner is the red cross on a white background that is familiar to many football fans, for example; and was carried on the shield of at least some English soldiers fighting in France. You will remember Shakespeare's version of the cry of the soldiers at Agincourt: "God for Harry, England, and St George". Some soldiers at Agincourt claimed to have seen him fighting on the English side.

Interestingly, it seems to have been during the Reformation that he came to his own as England's main patron saint, displacing Edward the Confessor and Edmund the Martyr, while Francis Drake and Walter Raleigh exported him to the New World. In recent years, he has taken on some political mileage, with various politicians presenting him as a symbol of sometimes rather alarming English nationalism; and nowadays there are many people agitating for April 23rd to be restored as a national holiday.

We should be cautious about this, however; for one thing, there is no evidence at all of George ever having been in this country, while for another, there is a clear danger of his being used to fuel ill-tempered tribal loyalty, with the implicit claim that "We are better than you lot", which seems an inappropriate fate for a canonised saint.

What else can we say about him? We are certainly short of facts about him. He is said to come from Lydda (modern Lod) in Palestine; and no doubt he would have views on the appalling devastation currently being inflicted on that sad part of the world. His name means "Farmer", which may not tell us anything at all. He is often depicted as a soldier, carrying his sword; but in fact, part of the legend has him arrested and tortured for refusing to serve in the Roman army under Diocletian. He is said to have been beheaded on April 23rd, and buried in Lydda. For his courage in standing up for the faith, he might be in these days an example worth following, since this country seems sadly to have forgotten about that faith, with catastrophic results. The Jesuit Bollandist historians established that George had indeed existed, and here at Farm St we revere the happily learned memory of Fr Herbert Thurston SJ, who likewise argued for the ancient memories contained in the tradition, and concluded that there was "no ground for doubting the historical existence of St George".

Then, of course, there is the dragon. As early as the 11th Century there was a legend about a fierce dragon

that had been tyrannising the local community. Most of the time the dragon was pacified by being given two sheep to eat; but then they started sacrificing humans, culminating in the choice of the daughter of the king to be a sacrificial victim. George, so the story goes, rescued her by bravely slaughtering the dragon; the king her father was so grateful that he offered George all kinds of treasures, which the hero admirably passed on to the poor. And the inhabitants of the city were so impressed that they all became Christian.

What might he say to us today? We are not compelled to buy into the whole legend; but we should notice that the virtues ascribed to George could help turn around this country today, in a year where there is to be a vote for a new government. He showed appropriate courage to stand out against the powerful; he defended the defenceless, and took care of the poor.

Might we, today, do you think, celebrate the ancient virtues of this country by asking to follow his courage and generosity? Might a slice of George's integrity in our politics make a difference to us all?
