Laetare Sunday

So here we are: the 4th Sunday of Lent has arrived, which means that today you can relax the savage austerities that you have undoubtedly been following during the first half of Lent. The principle here is not to abandon all discipline, but to reflect on where we have come from and where we are going. Because today it is headed into the darkness. You will notice that in the readings from now on the tone is a good deal darker. Where up to now we have been invited to look at ourselves and our sinfulness, from here on in the focus is on Jesus, and inevitably on the grim fact that Jesus is going to die on Good Friday. So you will notice that readings in the next two or three weeks are much more about Jesus, much less about ourselves. The Office of Readings finishes on Saturday with Exodus as its scriptural text, and sets off on a rather rapid gallop through the next few books of the Pentateuch. Next Sunday we go into the darkness of Passiontide. Tomorrow we shall start reading John's gospel during the week, and we shall remain with that extraordinary gospel almost all the way through until Pentecost. And even today, Laetare though it is, the readings are not all that bright and cheerful; for in the first reading we are given the end of the books of the Chronicles, stressing that we thoroughly deserve the punishment that is coming to us, because we have been so inattentive to the call of God; but it is God who is going to rescue us. The unimaginable evil had taken place, the walls of Jerusalem, God's Holy City, had been torn down, and the Temple, where God had been supposed to dwell had been utterly destroyed. And the people of Israel, a people that we thought was holy in the eyes of God, had been dragged off into Exile. None of this has been on the agenda – so did this mean that God was not God? That will have been the question on the lips of the chosen people (were they really "Chosen", after all?); and of course there are many people today who sing that same song, and who have decided that since the world is in such a terrible mess, there cannot possibly be a God. In that first reading, the Chronicler sings a song of rescue; so he believes that all will be well. You can feel that same song being sung also in the psalm for today. This is one of the few biblical texts that has been turned into a box office hit: "by the waters of Babylon, we sat down and wept...", with its terrible memories of exile. But of course, being able to sing about it means that the disaster will not be the end of the story, for God is at work. Something of the sort is there also in today's first reading, with its certainty that "God, being rich in mercy because of his great love, has in turn loved us – you have been saved by grace". "We are God's poem", he continues, "created in Christ Jesus". So it is indeed permitted to rejoice on this Laetare Sunday. That gracious certainty continues in the gospel reading for today, where we gaze upon the exaltation of Jesus on the cross. Nothing was worse than that terrible crucifixion; and yet, as the NT

frequently makes it utterly clear, it was because of that crucifixion, that "everyone who believes in him might have life eternal". Then we get that lovely reassurance: "for God so loved the world that he gave his only son, that everyone who believes in him might not be destroyed".

There is both darkness and light on this Laetare Sunday.

Peter's Way of the Cross

We are excited to announce that we will be hosting a performance of Peter's Way of the Cross at Farm Street Church on the evening of Friday March 22nd at 7pm preceded by Mass at 6pm. Peter's Way of the Cross is a 60-minute reflection which imagines St. Peter following the path of Jesus on his way to Calvary whilst reflecting on his journey as a disciple and as a witness to Christ's teachings. Peter begins his journey confused by the events of Gethsemane, the trial and is distressed and ashamed by his denial. At each station, the scene is described, and Peter reflects on Christ's teaching or actions from the three years of ministry. In each case the gospel passage used has been set to music. The words were written by Bernard Lavery KSG and the music composed by Giovanni Marseglia BM. The work has been performed in Westminster Cathedral, Killarney Cathedral, The Old Bailey and many parishes in the diocese. It was also used as the centrepiece of an evening celebration during the 2017 Westminster Diocese Pilgrimage to Lourdes and was enthusiastically received.
