MOTHER MARY AT EASTER

Farm Street is, of course, a Jesuit church dedicated to Mary, the mother of Jesus. In this Easter time we might reflect for a moment or two on how St Ignatius, the founder of the Jesuits, understood the part which Mary played in the Resurrection story.

In his Spiritual Exercises, Ignatius has the risen Jesus appear first to his mother. This is curious since nowhere in the Gospels is there a record of any such event. Indeed, one commentator points out that the phraseology used suggests that the resurrection and the appearance were almost simultaneous events. Why does Ignatius place such importance on this?

It certainly seems fitting that Jesus should first have appeared to his mother, but not so much as an exercise of filial duty. Rather, as Mary was the one to whom the coming of the Saviour was first announced, it might be thought appropriate that his victory over death should be announced to her first too. In doing this, moreover, he comes to console his mother who surely felt the pain of his death like no other.

But where did Ignatius get this idea from if not from the Gospels? It seems agreed that he is following an ancient tradition recorded in the "Life of Christ" by the fourteenth century Carthusian Ludolph of Saxony which he read while convalescing in the castle at Loyola after he was injured in the battle of Pamplona in 1521. Ludolph has Jesus and his mother talking to one another "full of joy while lovingly delighting in the Lord's paschal victory".

Furthermore, in the basilica at Manresa, which Ignatius will have known, there is a magnificent medieval altarpiece which depicts in one of its many panels Mary present at the resurrection. It is possible this also may have influenced him.

However, the best explanation of Ignatius having Jesus appear to his mother first of all that I have heard came, as I recall, from a fellow Jesuit, Fr Howard Grey, who led my final year of training, the "tertianship", many years ago.

He focussed our attention on the "grace" which Ignatius asks us to pray for at this stage of the Spiritual Exercises. We are "to ask for grace to feel gladness and to rejoice intensely over the great glory and joy of Christ our Lord". Note, that we are not asking to rejoice and be glad in ourselves so much as to rejoice and be glad at the rejoicing and gladness of Jesus as he rises from the dead.

This is very important. Our own feelings of joy and gladness inevitably come and go. Consequently, they do not have the stability which is essential to sustain any man or woman who has given over their life to following Jesus. On the other hand, the joy and gladness of Jesus is constant. Our participation in the joy and gladness of the risen Jesus, therefore, provides any disciple with the stability needed. Sharing in his joy, we are founded on rock.

Jesus' appearance first of all to his mother can be understood in the light of what we are praying for at Easter. Not everyone has the capacity for rejoicing in someone else's joy, but mothers often do: they can rejoice in the joy of their children. We are praying, therefore, for a grace which has already been given to Mary.

In this, as in so many other ways, Ignatius presents us with Mother Mary at Easter as the model of our discipleship of her son.
