REPENTANCE

We set out on a spiritual journey last week with a firm resolution to walk and find God anew. The Advent season we celebrate really does mark all of our lifetime until we come into full communion with God. We need these special occasions to raise our awareness of what is going on more deeply and commit ourselves more fervently. The journey continues until we breath our last, so we must carry on encouraging one another to allow the better part of ourselves to surface.

Even when we look at the readings to mark the second Advent Sunday, they cascade just like any journey with its ups and downs and twists and turns. Prophecy speaks of something that is new and sprouting; it talks of someone coming in history with integrity and justice (cf. Is 11:1). That person is a signal to everyone that God is faithful to His people and never seeks to abandon them. As we are journeying through this life, it seems helpful to realize a couple of moments the Scripture offers us today through the prophet Isaiah:

1. Looking up to someone who has been promised by God and preached about by prophets. He is the man of integrity and justice who will put to rest all of our inadequacies we suffer from and injustices we cause to one another. He is the promise of being liberated.

2. God's presence in the world takes on many forms and we need to figure out God's communication with us, especially when He seems absent.

It's no surprise that this basic message leads us to a twofold positive realization of hope and repentance, and it serves as an inspiration to go on walking the journey we set out on last week.

As we sing the Psalm about justice and peace, our cascade falls on the virtue of hope. Just St Paul urged Romans, he appeals to us to cherish hope, "Everything that was written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us about hope from the examples scripture gives of how people who did not give up were helped by God." (Rom15:4)

We are no longer at the start of our walking and therefore we need a way to check in where we are. Ignatius calls "consolation every increase of faith, hope, and love, and all interior joy that invites and attracts to what is heavenly and to the salvation of one's soul by filling it with peace and quiet in its Creator and Lord." (SpEx 316) This time of Advent journey is to check in whether we are moving and in what direction. Are we making progress?

It is no surprise for us that the Church's liturgy chooses to challenge us this week. This is all for our own good because only from the hope promise we embrace the Gospel calling to repent and change.

We may think of change as something to achieve or indeed difficult to achieve. The singular and extraordinary example of John the Baptist calling us to adopt repentance as a way of living and himself living off in simplicity does not exactly build confidence that a change in our humble endeavour is possible. John was a huge achiever by living in the extreme of desert, not preaching in the Holy City of Jerusalem, being apart from the Temple and away from the court. He embodies the voice that cries in wilderness to

prepare the way for the Lord's coming (cf. Is 40:3) and remains an authority among prophets to this day.

Perhaps if we think of conversion in terms of compassion, we may be able to turn away for the time being from the laws and authorities that hold us to a certain conduct and thus risking to become ineffective in our spiritual journey. Instead, we may want to focus more on our personal vocation, response to what the journey towards God offers us with a vision to build community anew again starting from myself. We can only draw from strength and inspiration to keep our motivation going as we tread through all sorts of difficulties in the Advent of our life. Always allowing God to change us brings gradually our baptismal promises to fulfilment. And God is changing us, our faith hope and love in God in Trinity grows, matures and comes across as more intriguing in a wider society if not credible. An attitude of conversion sustains us and brings others closer to the Lord and His Goodness.

Where is my Advent path taking me?

How can I practice compassion to sustain my Advent journey?
