Responding to a recommendation by a regular film club supoprter, the film this month is 'Ida', a 2013 foreign language drama, written and directed by Pawel Pawlikoswki. The film was voted Best Film by the European Film Academy in 2014, Best Non-English Film by BAFTA in 2014 and Best Foreign Language Film at the 2015 Academy Awards. Quite a pedigree. Set in Poland in 1962, it follows a young woman on the verge of taking vows as a Catholic nun. Orphaned as an infant during the German occupation of World War II, she must meet her aunt, a former Communist state prosecutor and only surviving relative, who tells her that her parents were Jewish. The two women embark on a road trip into the Polish countryside to learn the fate of their relatives.

## **CONVERSATIONS IN THE SPIRIT**

Most of us enjoy conversations. I find them fascinating: I get to know more about people, about how they are thinking and feeling; about their life experiences and how those experiences have shaped and are shaping them.

Conversations are also privileged opportunities to give support to others and, of course, for them to give support to us as well. We human beings are not made to live isolated lives but in communities of many kinds, I'm sure of that, and conversations both express and build up our lives together.

Maybe like me you have long-since discovered that the secret to being a good conversationalist is to talk less and to listen more. Listening well is an art always worth cultivating. We need to listen not only with our ears but also with our hearts, not only to what is being said but to the underneath of what is being said and to what is not said. As others share something of themselves with us, we need to be prepared to share something of ourselves with them. In this way, good conversation builds up mutual trust, the hallmark of friendship.

In the Gospels, we see Jesus having many conversations in which men and women come to greater clarity and understanding about who he is and what he is asking of them. His encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well in the fourth chapter of John's gospel is one example and another is his dialogue after the resurrection in chapter 24 of Luke's gospel with the two disciples on the road to Emmaus.

The founder of the Jesuits, St Ignatius Loyola, valued conversations greatly. During a retreat following his *Spiritual Exercises*, it is in conversation with the retreat guide that the one making the retreat comes to understand more clearly how and where the Lord is leading.

Ignatius also set great store by those conversations in which we seek together the ways in which to follow Jesus more closely in their lives. In what have been known as "conversations in the spirit", dialogues characterised by prayerful sharing and listening, we can all the more readily have an ear for where the Lord is leading us, for lead us he certainly does.

The Sunday, the celebrant at each mass, either in his homily or during the notices at the end of mass, will speak about the first session of the Synod which took place in Rome last October and the second session which will take place next October. Both sessions involve the Pope and a number of bishops, together with lay participants and religious men and women, all drawn from around the world. The theme common to both the first and second session of this Synod is how our Church can become more "synodal".

"Conversations in the spirit", in which we prayerfully share and listen with one another, often aided by a suitably informed facilitator, are at the heart of synodality. The Pope is encouraging us to become a Church which engages in such conversations, in parishes and dioceses and as well as in the Church as a whole. These are conversations in which we focus on our hopes for the mission of the Church: how can we reach out more effectively to the people we love and those we don't; to those who long to encounter Jesus as well as those who, perhaps because of a hurt they are suffered, do not?

Following the example of St Ignatius, the Pope believes that by engaging in conversations of this kind, we can come to understand with greater clarity how the Lord is inviting us to renew our mission in the world today. In this way, those charged with making decisions, the Pope and his fellow bishops, will be all the more able to inform those decisions with what they have heard the Holy Spirit say to the Church, through the likes of us.

My own experience of these "conversations in the spirit" has been very positive. I have learnt so much listening to men and women share their hopes for the Church they love. By sharing my own hopes, I trust that, in some small way, I have contributed to the development of the Church I also love, something which matters to me very much, as I'm sure it does to you too.

# Peter's Way of the Cross We are excited to announce that we will be hosting a

performance of *Peter's Way of the Cross* at the Farm Street on the evening of **Friday March 22<sup>nd</sup> at 6.30pm** preceded by Mass at 6pm. Peter's Way of the Cross is a 60-minute reflection which imagines St. Peter following the path of Jesus on his way to Calvary whilst reflecting on his journey as a disciple and as a witness to Christ's teachings. Peter begins his journey confused by the events of Gethsemane, the trial and is distressed and ashamed by his denial. At each station, the scene is described, and Peter reflects on Christ's teaching or actions from the three years of ministry. In each case the gospel passage used has been set to music.

The words were written by Bernard Lavery KSG and the music composed by Giovanni Marseglia BM. The work has been performed in Westminster Cathedral, Killarney Cathedral, The Old Bailey and many parishes in the diocese. It was also used as the centrepiece of an evening celebration during the 2017 Westminster Diocese Pilgrimage to Lourdes and was enthusiastically received.
