ASK AND IT WILL BE GIVEN TO YOU

Today's Gospel encourages us to pray to God for the things that we need and promises us that we will receive the things for which we ask. It is a very comforting Gospel but it may leave us with a certain sense of unease. There are times when it does not seem to fit with our experience. Perhaps we remember occasions when we have prayed for something and it has not worked out in the way we hoped. Often we keep praying for things in the world, like peace and justice, and our world can often seem even more violent and more unjust.

YIMANY

In these circumstances we can find ourselves asking what is wrong. Are we praying the wrong way? If only I say this or that prayer, if I only I pray more often or with more trust then God will listen. If only I was a better person, God would love me more and do what I ask. However, this does not fit with what we know about the love of God. Jesus tells that we should not go on heaping up lots of prayers. God knows what we need before we ask. We also know we cannot earn God's love. The New Testament is full of accounts of God's mercy. It reminds us that God loved us while we were still sinners and that is why Christ came into the world. The Psalms are also full of complaints that it is the wicked who prosper. The idea that if we do the right thing then God will do what we want does not seem to fit either with our experience or scripture. What is more it is not Christian.

Our trust in God's love and care does not mean that we expect God to rescue us, or our loved ones, from the ordinary business of life. It was our ordinary lives, which include the reality of suffering and death, which Christ came to share and transform. That includes the reality of suffering on a grand scale, of disaster, natural and manmade. These are also events Jesus shared in. According to Luke's Gospel it was the demands of those in power which lead to Jesus being born in Bethlehem in the first place and Matthew tells us of the Holy Family fleeing to Egypt as refugees.

Neither is it helpful to imagine God as a puppet master, capriciously manipulating the details of our lives. We can quickly fall prey to superstition. Again the idea that we can somehow buy God's love by our practice. We become no different from those who believe in gods who have to be appeased by various rituals, like the pagans of Jesus time, or who think their lives are governed by the movement of the stars. That is not what the Church's life of prayer is about.

We trust in a God who knows our needs and whose love for us is boundless. But as Christians we believe in "God with us". We believe in the one who has shared in all the difficulties of our lives and transformed the meaning of those lives by his cross and resurrection. This above all is our hope. It is right that we should pray to God for what we need but we must trust God to work out his providence in ways which are "greater than we can ask or imagine", as Paul puts it. We need to hope and trust even, indeed especially, in those time when we are called to share in the cross of Christ. We live through those time when things do not seem to go our way and God can seem very distant. We can do that because of our faith in Christ and that, through his death and resurrection, whole of creation has been transformed. It is because he knew that we would experience those difficult times that Jesus said what he says in today's Gospel.

Overview of the week

This week-long summer school is for those who want to take time with God to give their faith a check-up and perhaps to develop it in a new way. Sessions focus on prayer, discernment and decisionmaking, synodality, scripture and relationships with some of those on the margins of society. The course is designed to allow participants to attend all, some or only one of the sessions depending on their needs and availability. *Each session includes table fellowship over a simple meal, the course itself* (*there will be a choice of options per session*) and a *time of communal prayer to end the day.*
