To complete the theme around the troubles during the 1980s in El Salvador, this month the Film Club will show the 1986 Oscar-nominated war drama, 'Salvador', co-written and directed by Hollywood legend, Oliver Stone. The film tells the story of an American journalist, played by the ever-watchable James Woods (nominated for Best Actor), covering the civil war in the country who becomes entangled with both the FMLN and the right-wing military dictatorship while trying to rescue his girlfriend and her children. The film is sympathetic toward the left-wing revolutionaries and strongly critical of the US-supported military dictatorship, focusing on the assassination of Archbishop Oscar Romero and the murder of four American nuns by government death squads. After some heavy films shown at the Film Club in recent months, we promise to lighten the tone next month!

LET MY CRY COME UNTO THEE

Over the last couple of weeks we have been reading the section of the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus takes the requirements of the Law of Moses and takes it further. "You have learnt how it was said...But I say this to you." The ordinary conventional morality is not good enough, we are asked to do things which are shocking and demanding. It all leads up to the conclusion, "You must, therefore, be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect." If we want to know how we should behave we need to look at the example of how God deals with us.

This week the focus is on our relationship with others. First of all, Jesus looks at how we deal with those who wrong us or offend us. The natural reaction is to seek to exact punishment or revenge. The law of "an eye for an eye and a tooth for tooth" was meant to keep this within socially acceptable bounds and avoid unending feuds. There is no room for any of this for Jesus. He expects an open generosity, not just to the "deserving poor", but to all those who make demands of us. Perhaps there is an element of hyperbole in what Jesus says, as there is earlier in the Sermon on the Mount. However, we have to remember that our example to follow is the generosity of God. How does God deal with us when we do things which do him dishonour, especially perhaps when we fail to acknowledge his presence in other people and in creation. We know our Father is merciful and forgiving, we experience that day by day in our lives. At Mass we celebrate that mercy shown to its greatest extent in the death and resurrection of Jesus. How would it be if we showed that same mercy and forgiveness in our lives? What might our penal system look like if it had no element of revenge but rather saw in the criminal a sinner, like us, in whom Christ is present? It is asking a lot of the victims of crime, it is not easy and there are no easy answers. However, we have to take what Jesus says seriously.

Secondly, there is the question of how we treat those we regard as enemies. It is easy to love those who are like us, our "neighbours" and "brothers" as Jesus calls them. The more remote people are, the less "like us", the less we can see them as real individual human beings, the easier it becomes to stereotype, to see them as alien, to seek to protect ourselves against them. In a world in which nationalism is the growing trend in many places, a world in which it is seen as acceptable to put "our people" first and see others as a threat, what does it mean for us to be Catholic Christians? We belong to a universal Church, a Church of all peoples and all cultures, that

is what catholic means. Is our political morality that of the "tax collectors" and "pagans" or that of the disciples of Christ? Our God is the Father of all people. That was one of the things which the early Church found most hard to accept. It is one of the things which can be most difficult for us really to take to heart today. However, if we are to be perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect, we must see all people, of whatever race, culture or nationality, as He sees them.

It is clear that following the demands of the Sermon on the Mount is not just a matter of keeping the rules or of following conventional morality. If we try to do this we are likely to find we are going against what "ordinary decent people" think is right. It is a perfection which is an attribute of God; we cannot achieve it on our own. It is that grace that we must pray for as we hear today's Gospel.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, this year observed on Wednesday 22nd February. Mass with imposition of ashes will be celebrated at the usual times of 8am, 1.05pm, and 6pm. Organ music will accompany the 1.05pm Mass and the Farm Street Choir will accompany the 6pm Mass. Lent is a solemn period in the Church's calendar and a good start will help all of us as we observe this penitential season. Due to its penitential significance, Ash Wednesday is a day of fasting and abstinence. All Catholics are bound to abstain from meat and Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast. Why Believe? Defending and Explaining the Faith

Tuesday, 28 February 2023 to Tuesday 28th March 2023 12:00pm - 1:00pm

In this course we take a hard look at some of the most difficult questions that are asked of the Christian faith, so as to think about it more clearly, explain it more persuasively and defend it more effectively. For example, there seem to be some bad reasons to believe in God, but are there any really good reasons? And even if there are some good reasons to support belief in God, aren't there also lots of reasons not to believe? What about the thought that belief in God is irrelevant to the most important things in our lives, anyway? Can't people be 'good without God'? Why bother trying to resolve questions that lie beyond the limits of our understanding?

In each week of the course we take a look at one problematic question or an objection to Christian belief, and see what kinds of response might usefully be put forward in response.
