# THE BOOK OF REVELATION

This afternoon, Sunday May 21st, I shall be making my way, with a group of eager Bible readers, to the Isle of Patmos, in the Aegean Sea, within sight of the Turkish coast. It is a rocky and barren place, and it is the site, so far as we can tell, where the Book of Revelation, the last book in our Bible, was dictated to the one whom we know as "John".

But there is a difficulty with the Book of Revelation, namely that people are absolutely terrified by it; sometimes they read it as a train timetable, enabling us to predict the scheduled arrival times for various appalling disasters that are on their way to destroy us all. My suggestion here is that you do not read this extraordinary text in quite that way. You should read it, instead, as a message given to those who are suffering appalling oppression; If that is indeed the case, then, he claims, there is nothing at all to worry about. What the Apocalypse is saying to us is that God is in charge of this wonderful world, and so all is going to be well.

It is important to realise that the author is speaking to people whom he knew; those "letters" in chapters 2 and 3 of the document are clearly addressed to the seven cities named there, and they are in the real world, people whose weaknesses are only too well-known to the author and to God. So this is not a magical, "Harry Potter", sort of world. It is written to a group of Christians who are enduring unprecedented persecution from the Roman authorities. It approaches its task in ways that are, if they are listening, enormously encouraging in the face of hostility; you might find it reassuring therefore to read the whole text again, this time as *your* story. The group to whom he is writing live in Asia Minor; and in this text they are being reassured that God knows what they are going through, and that God is in charge of this strange world of ours. This message is then supported by a series of astonishing visions; and the point of the visions is not (this cannot be stressed too strongly) to alarm us, but to give us courage and hope in the face of adversity.

In addition to the dreams or visions, there are glimpses, especially in chapters 4 and 5, of the liturgy that is going on in heaven, as the author puts it, around the Throne and the Lamb. And here the Throne is clearly God, while the Lamb is the one who is slaughtered and lives again; and that of course is Jesus, victorious over death. So we listen in awe to the heavenly hymnsinging, and take immense courage from it. Why not just read through those two chapters, and listen to the extraordinary sound that they make?

Then there is no need to stick only to those two chapters, chapters four and five, but I suggest that you read slowly and reflectively through the whole of the rest of the book. It would be a good idea for you to do that between now and Pentecost, just to make yourself ready for next Sunday's celebration. There are many passages to pick out; but if you are looking at your watches and wondering if you have time, then at least go to chapter 22. There you will find the most extraordinary vision, one that is meant to give you immense courage: it begins dramatically, "and I saw a new heaven and a new earth". Pause there to think of the biblical reference: we are being invited to remember the very first words of the Bible, "in the beginning God created heaven and earth", So what is on offer here is nothing less than a totally new creation. Then the novelty goes even deeper: "I saw the Holy City, New Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared like a bride made ready for her husband". This is backed up with the beautiful words that we might make our own: "Look! The tent of God with humanity; and he will pitch his tent with them, and they shall be his peoples and God himself will be their God". Then there is a beautiful maternal image, borrowed from Isaiah chapter 25, promising that God will "wipe away every tear from their eyes and death shall be no more, no mourning, nor weeping, nor, any trouble at all shall exist anymore, because the old things have passed away".

Do you think that you could find time, this week, to read slowly and prayerfully through the Book of Revelation? You will not regret it.
