Conversation in Colour; A Mother -Daughter Exhibition by Margaret Campbell (1936 - 2017) and Fiona Campbell Hicks (1973 -) of poems and images

In a thread running from the 1950s to present day, Margaret Campbell and her daughter work(ed) in seeking to create a joyous private imagery that was at its high point a conversation around the beauty of God through art. Caught up in the Troubles in Northern Ireland in the 1970s, the family, a Catholic - Protestant mixed faith family, left for the safety of England. Both Margaret and her daughter were traumatised by the violence. Aged 3 at the time, Fiona Campbell Hicks was unable to create any art until she reached her twenties. Art became part of their healing through colour and nature. The show is an exploration of their journey from conflict to recovery, and hopes to be an evocation of the infinite beauty, colour and delight of God, as well as examining the mother daughter relationship. The exhibition features egg tempera icons, water colours, pastels, calligraphy, poetry and photographic prints on glass.

The exhibition explores the close and at times co-dependent relationship between parent and child, and between artists. Both address(ed) themes of catholic spirituality and a love of nature. Encompassing ideas of ecumenism, recovery and relationship, the exhibition creates a colourful world with a bestiary of watercolours, icons of Christ and the saints, as well as poetry and large scale photographic prints of lakes.

FIRST

DEEPER INTO THE MYSTERY

Today's gospel reading comes from the very end of the Last Supper discourse that Jesus delivered to his disciples on the night before he died. The discourse is a long one, of course, five chapters in all, and it is important, for it faces the question of how we are to cope with Jesus' absence. We are invited to eavesdrop on his prayer for those who are present at this meal, but also for another group, namely "those who through their word believe in me". And that is us, of course.

In particular he prays for something that the Church has never really had, namely unity, to reflect the relationship between the Father and the Son, "that they may be in us, and that the world may believe that it was you who sent me". We remember, of course, that "the world" is an ambiguous symbol in this gospel. It normally represents those who are closed to God's project but sometimes it is also those who are the object of God's love. However the main point here is the prayer for unity: "that they may be one as you and I are one, I in them and you in me, that they may be perfected into one". And it all has to do with love: this Last Supper discourse, you may remember, started with several references to love, and then strikingly continued with Jesus acting out love in the washing of the disciples' feet. And now it concludes with several more references to love. So, Jesus continues, "that the world may know that you sent me, and that you love them just as vou loved me".

As we come towards the end of the Easter season, it is essential that we grasp this profound continuity between God and Jesus, so that, as he puts it, "they too may be with me, that they may see my glory which you gave me". Next we are given the argument on which it all depends: "because you loved me before the foundation of the world". Then, finally, we reach the last, despairing, plea from Jesus to his Father: "righteous Father, the world did not know you, but I knew you and these people knew that you sent me". We hardly understand what is going on here, but we are travelling now deep into the mystery that is the Jesus who has been sent by his Father.

And as he continues, we try to grasp what he is saying: "I have made known your name to them". And the "name", of course, is that sacred name of God, which we may not pronounce, but which carries the profound reality of who God is. What Jesus is doing in this Last Supper discourse, is not just telling puzzled and frightened disciples what is happening; he is also reassuring us that we are going to survive the awfulness that lies ahead. Once again, it is all about love: "that the love with which you loved me may be in them and that I may be in them."

So there you have it: the whole thing is a matter of love, and love is right at the heart of the story. What the Father sent Jesus to do is also, and we must not run away from this, right at the heart of what we are supposed to do. What that means in practice is now revealed in the very next events that take place in the story, take us deeper into the mystery.

For the next chapter begins, "having said this, Jesus went out with his disciples to the other side of the Wadi Kedron, where there was a garden which he and his disciples entered". And we know perfectly well what is going to happen here: the mystery gets deeper, Jesus is arrested, and the disciples have no idea how to respond, beyond Simon Peter's absurd gesture with the sword with which he "struck the ear of the High Priest's servant and cut off his right ear lobe".

We need to listen carefully to what is going on here, if we are to perform our task of going "deeper into the mystery".
