Love One Another As I Have Loved You

About 18 months ago, the London Jesuit Centre sponsored a series of events called "Good Books". In the first of these, Tom Holland spoke and then responded to questions about his recently published "Dominion" in which he put forward the thesis that to understand modern Britain, indeed the "making of the western mind", you need to understand its Christian heritage. It may be that fewer profess a belief in Jesus Christ, let alone regularly practise their faith on Sundays, but the deep values of our society are nonetheless shaped by the Gospel.

Many would question Tom Holland's optimistic view, and some, including myself, did that evening. But I am put in mind of it each Thursday, roundabout lunchtime, when I and another member of my Jesuit community near Swiss Cottage spend a couple of hours delivering food parcels on behalf of the Jesuit Refugee Service. Our weekly round takes us anywhere from Shepherd's Bush to Harrow. It begins at the North Paddington Food bank, which is based, if you know the area, in a community hall on Elgin Avenue near its junction with Harrow Road and in St Luke's Anglican church in Queen's Park.

What strikes again and again me about these food banks is the care with which the staff and volunteers, who give up hours each week to help some of north London's poorest, go about their work. Dietary needs are accommodated, a variety of food is selected and then carefully packed into labelled carrier bags. Every so often, we see food being donated from a bakery nearly and I will not quickly forget the love shown to one woman and the difference which that kindness clearly made to her.

As we know, there are many more of these food banks up and down the country. Sadly, at a time when too many of our families are experiencing "food poverty", they have become a feature of our towns and cities today. I do not know the extent to which their organisers and volunteers are explicitly motivated by the Gospel of Jesus, perhaps they are or perhaps not, but these good people certainly know how to put the words of Jesus from this Sunday's Gospel into practice, "Love one another as I have loved you". Jesus also says in the same reading, "Greater love has no man that this, that he lay down his life for his friends". Generously putting the needs of others before our own in everyday ways is how most of us will put these words into practice. It seems to me that those who work in these food banks are doing that too.

These places might also illustrate a theme in this Sunday's first reading from the Acts of the Apostles which tells us about St Peter's encounter with a Roman centurion, Cornelius, which proved decisive in the life of the Church in the years after Jesus' resurrection. Peter saw for himself how the Holy Spirit was working in Cornelius and this convinced him that the community of the followers of Christ needed to be open to Gentiles as well as Jews, to embrace everyone, as Jesus embraced everyone. Peter then set about overcoming the obstacles to making his vision a reality. The people who benefit from the food bank we visit are of many faiths and ethnic backgrounds and this can remind us of what the Church today is called to be, welcoming of and responding to the needs of everyone. Like Peter we need to overcome any obstacles there may be to making this a reality.

This has been a very difficult year. Life has been so restricted and many people have suffered too much. Despite the greater sense of hope that is around thanks to the success of the vaccination programme, there is still much anxiety about the future.

In the second reading for this Sunday, St John tells us that, "My dear people, let us love one another, since love comes from God". Maybe it is possible that during this year, despite and even because of its difficulties, we have become more sensitive to the needs of others, more willing to come to help those in need, more willing to accept the stranger as our brother or sister and more prepared to put the needs of others before our own.

Perhaps this is evidence that Tom Holland is right that Christian values are in fact deeply embedded in our society. That in turn can make us hopeful that there is a greater readiness in modern Britain than we often suspect to hear and accept Jesus and his Gospel. That is a thought that can encourage us all, as can this prayer for the mass of the Sixth Sunday of Easter.

Grant, almighty God, that we may celebrate with heartfelt devotion these days of joy, which we keep in honour of the risen Lord, and that what we relive in remembrance we may always hold to in what we do. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Feast of the Ascension

The Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord will be celebrated on Thursday 13th May. In ordinary times, the Feast of the Ascension would be a holy day of obligation in England and Wales. However, the obligation to attend Mass remains suspended. Nevertheless, we are encouraged to do something to sanctify holy days even if we cannot physically attend Mass, whether it be devoting time to private prayer, Scripture reading, or watching Mass via livestream. Mass will be celebrated at 8am, 1.05pm and 6pm on Thursday, with music provided by the choir at the 1.05pm and 6pm Mass. All Masses are livestreamed.
