#### TAKE LORD AND RECEIVE

This Sunday, Jesuits celebrate the feast-day of our extraordinary founder, who fell in love with the Lord - which made all the difference. And this year is different (perhaps every year is different?) because we have been celebrating the quatercentenary of the most famous cannonball in history, the one that irreparably broke the leg of the Basque nobleman whom we know as Inigo de Loyola, brought to an end his quixotic defence of the citadel of Pamplona, and started him on a journey that continues even today. Because of that, we Jesuits have been asked on this feast-day to join Fr Sosa, our General in Rome, in his reconsecration of the Society of Jesus to the Sacred Heart, which we shall be doing today. So: what is this "Sacred Heart"? Generations of Catholics grew up with a slightly overwhelming sense of unease about it, rather solemn French lithographs picturing Jesus with his beating heart all too visible. But there should be no unease here; we need to see it in the context of a tendency in Christianity, and perhaps especially in Catholicism, to make it all too intellectual, too unemotional. What we need is to open up to the love that is at the heart of all that is, the love that is what makes us human beings "tick". That is the way we are invited to be who we really are.

And what is it that we are doing today, when we make this "reconsecration"? The point of it is the affirmation of the love of Jesus, and the way that we have found it to be at work in our lives, and in the lives of the people whom we serve. Implicitly there is a call here to "conversion"; and there never comes a time, of course, when Jesuits do not need to become converted. Always there is a need for us to change, in order to reveal the unfailing tenderness of God, as it works out in the world. And this impetus to change absolutely fits with those Spiritual Exercises that are so profoundly at the heart of what we are supposed to be doing as Jesuits. Ignatius says (and we shall do well to reflect on this in our lives) "by consolation I mean what occurs when the soul...is inflamed with love of its Creator and Lord. As a result it can love no created thing on the face of the earth in itself, but only in the Creator of them all...under the word "consolation" I include every increase in faith, hope and charity, and every interior joy that calls and attracts one to heavenly things and to the salvation of one's soul, by bringing it tranquillity and peace in its Creator and Lord".

So, you ask: what are we supposed to do about this consolation? That is perhaps too much of a commercial question; we are not supposed to do anything. Our task is simply to listen unendingly to God's unfailing invitation to love. That is what animates Jesus; that is what underlies all that Jesuits are doing, wherever we do it; and that is the name of what is going on here in our celebration of the man whose dying, and, much more important, whose

conversion, we are being invited, to recall today. What I suggest that you might like to do today, is to recite with us this prayer; it is not an easy one, but it is powerful, and it comes very close indeed to describing what Jesuits and the Spiritual Exercises are all about. It comes as the climax of the "contemplation for obtaining love", at the end of the Spiritual Exercises. As you recite it, listen carefully to what you are saying. It is quite a challenge; but you will not regret it.

This is how it goes:

Take Lord, and receive all my liberty, my memory, my understanding, and my entire will, all that I have and possess. You have given all to me. To You, O Lord, I return it. All is Yours, dispose of it wholly according to Your will. Give me only Your love and Your grace; that is enough for me. AMEN
