THE POWER AND WISDOM OF GOD

Regular Farm Street parishioners will have noticed that most, if not all, Jesuits get moved from one place to another, from one assignment to another, quite frequently. I have found that one of the advantages of this is that I don't accumulate too much stuff, books in particular, since each move is accompanied by an enthusiastic clear out. Only those books I really need or which have meant a lot to me over the years stay with me.

One book have travelled with me to my various postings for about 25 years. I find myself returning to it again and again. It's called "Following Christ in a Consumer Society" and it's by an American Jesuit who taught in St Louis University for many years, John Kavanaugh.

I find he analyses the way we live now helpfully and convincingly. There is so much in our culture which tells us that the happiness and fulfilment we long for will be found by having this or that, by dressing like him or her or by going here or there to this or that exotic place on holiday, in other words. How different this is from the message of Jesus that our fulfilment lies not in satisfying our needs but in what we give to others, in the quality of our relationships with one another, especially with those who have least, and with God.

A similar contrast between the way we live now and the way Jesus teaches is given by Henri Nouwen. He contrasts the "ascending way" which the world tells us to adopt – climbing up the ladder of promotion, having status and being well thought of by the high and mighty – with the "descending way" which Jesus showed us when at the Last Supper as he removed his outer garment, tied a towel around his waist and did the work of the servant, washing the feet his disciples.

When I worked in education, people used to complain that after their confirmation at the age of about 14, young people were rarely seen in church, and that there must be something very wrong with the quality or religious education and of Catholic life in schools. In my experience, schools went to great lengths to teach and to encourage students to practise the Catholic faith well. The problem rather, as both Kavanaugh and Nouwen in their different ways point out, is the powerful influence which the surrounding culture has on young people which makes it very hard for them, as it does for us, to hear and then live the message of the Gospel.

I was put in mind of this by the second reading of today's mass, the third Sunday of Lent. St Paul is writing to the Christian community in Corinth and contrast the "descending way" of Christ, of suffering and death which leads to life, which we as his disciples are invited to follow, and the way of the world. This way of Christ is "a stumbling block to the Jews and folly to the Gentiles" but "to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God".

Lent is, of course, a time of conversion when we are all invited to live the way of Christ with greater integrity. What resources do we have to live our faith in Christ in so counter-cultural a way? It makes me think how much I need to place the Eucharist in the centre of my life: to hear the Word of God, to let it inspire and challenge me; to encounter Christ in communion, when he is as near to me as I am to myself; and to have the support of all those around me who similarly have heard the call to follow Christ and to live his way of service and love in the world today.

This is one reason why I for one have found the past year difficult, when for much of the time we have not been able to gather together as a worshipping community, and look forward to that time, hopefully soon, when we'll all be able to gather again in person to celebrate the presence of Christ amongst us and to encourage each other along the way.

Cardinal's Lenten Appeal

Encounters with Jesus in Lent

Farm Street Church and The Grosvenor Chapel are running a joint Lent reflection course titled 'Encounters with Jesus'. This is being held via Zoom at 8pm on six consecutive Wednesdays, beginning on the 24th of February and concluding on the 31st March. The course will reflect on the encounters with Jesus experienced by people in the Gospels and will use the Spiritual Exercises of St Ignatius of Loyola as a guide.

Each session will consist of 1.) A Brief Introduction, 2.) A Scriptural Reading, 3.) A 20-minute Guided Meditation on the Reading, 4.) Break out rooms to reflect on the Guided Meditation (20 minutes) with Facilitator in each Group 5.) Return to plenary and Final Prayers.

This Wednesday is Week 3, which will focus on the miracle of Jesus walking on the water, as recorded in Matthew 14:22-33. The theme for the remaining weeks is:

Week 4: Bartimaeus Mk 10:46-52

Week 5: This man was Son of God Mk 15: 33-39

Week 6. Mary at the tomb Jn 20: 11-18

Novena of Grace

We will be praying the Novena of Grace to St Francis Xavier at every Mass from Thursday 4th March to Friday 12th March. This year we have invited nine people from around the world to record a short novena video, addressing the question 'What does it means to be a missionary Church today?' The videos will be posted by 12 noon daily on our website, YouTube page, and social media platforms. The text for the novena prayer is printed below:

O most kind and loving saint, in union with you I adore the Most Divine Majesty. The memory of the favours with which God blessed you during life, and of your glory after death, fills me with joy; and I unite with you in offering to Him my humble tribute of thanksgiving and praise. I implore of you to secure for me, through your powerful intercession, the all-important blessing of living and dying in a state of grace. I also ask you to obtain the favour I ask in this Novena (here ask the favour you wish to obtain), but if what I ask is not for the greater glory of God or the good of my soul, obtain for me what is most conducive to both. Amen

O God who was pleased to gather to your Church the peoples of the East by the preaching and miracles of St Francis Xavier, mercifully grant that we, who honour his glorious merits, may also imitate the example of his virtues, through Jesus Christ Our Lord. Amen

Help the Homeless Donation Hub

During the first Covid 19 lockdown in the Spring 2020, Companions of the Order of Malta and Westminster City Council worked in partnership to start a donation hub for the homeless. The aim was to streamline the donations available and produce a circular network where the necessary supplies were available to support vulnerable individuals being housed in the hotels and hostels and the street population.

35,000 items were sorted and packed at St Joseph's Hall, Brompton Oratory from April to July and then delivered to the homeless. The donation hub opened again in November 2020, and we open to receive donations again.
