# HOMECOMING

Joy is the best perseverance in homecoming as we continue our spiritual journey, we are urged and encouraged to seek joy through all of our walking. It may be going just fine, in which case, stay calm and carry on. It may also be for some of us a point of crisis. Instead of feeling our own fragility, let us take the point of crisis as a new opportunity to recommit ourselves to our spiritual path of growth and hold on to expecting the Lord's salvation.

When we look at the readings to mark the third Advent Sunday, they speak of joy in wilderness (cf. Is 35:1). The prophet speaks to those captured in Babylon when people lost all hope. It really takes courage to cross the desert that stands in between Babylon and Jerusalem to reach back the Holy City after being humiliated just like it takes courage to walk through the Advent season to celebrate the feast of the Incarnation in a meaningful way. The terrible experience of feeling trapped and unable to move with the prospect of going through all sorts of obstacles and hindrance may prevent some from even starting up the journey. It may slow others down after they have set out on their journey. It may also further stop others alongside their journey and never being able to reach their own liberation. Joy should fuel courage to take up the path and together they should be enough to keep us on the journey to homecoming.

The Psalm today is a fitting song to cry out in vulnerable times "Come Lord and save us" because you Lord always are the one who preserves our faith, feeds us and makes us to see beyond our individual circumstances. The Lord embodies justice in face of all injustice we may suffer.

And if joy and courage is not enough and we run out, then there is the patience through which we cultivate perseverance and preserve hopeful homecoming. Just as St Paul appeals "Be patient until the Lord's coming." (James 5:7)

Because we have progressed and used some of our motivation and strength on this spiritual journey, we no longer have the same amount of energy and may feel strained. It is important then to follow Ignatius' advice "to mind where I am going and the purpose." (SpEx 206).

Even the Gospel of Matthew presents us with and obstacle, a doubt: Is Jesus really the Messiah or not? This very question seems to occupy John the Baptist in the face of what he hears about Christ. He too – like each of us – had formed his own idea of who the Christ should have been and how the Messiah should come to liberate His people.

But seeing what he sees, he feels the story is different from what he previously expected: he expected a "purifier", a messiah who would distribute rewards and above all punishments to sinners. Instead, he receives a shocking answer from Jesus to look at what is going on: those who are wounded by life, find full renewal of life.

We are not to be scandalized by the way God operates. The Messiah, God-with-us, is also Godfor-us. The novelty of the Gospel lies in this: God who becomes incarnate, at the same time is God willing to save everyone. Do we have the courage to hear the Good News?

Even if all of this weren't credible enough, Jesus goes on to speak more profoundly that the Kingdom of heaven is the condition in which everyone who belongs is greater than John the Baptist himself, the greatest prophet amongst all.

An unexpected Messiah and almost an incredible message: God humbles Himself to save everyone. That is God's Homecoming.

What do I need most in these days?

Joy? Courage? Patience? Perseverance? And how do I get it?

What Messiah am I expecting? What do I observe that is going on in my life and on my Advent journey and in my community?
