GAUDETE – "REJOICE"

Today is the day when the Church encourages us to *rejoice*, the third Sunday of the time of preparation that we call "Advent". And what are we to rejoice about? Well in the first place, you may feel inclined to rejoice that, at least for today, you do not have to continue your Advent penance.

But what we are *not* being invited to do is rejoice at having been able to persuade one of my "loved ones" to buy exactly that present which I have been coveting for a while. That is not what the season is about; nor is it even the (perhaps rather more creditable) satisfaction of having tracked down precisely that gift that will do nicely for another "loved one". Nor does our joy come at this time because we have been able to organise a spectacularly extravagant meal, with immense quantities of the best food and drink.

So where are we to find our joy this week? Well, our task is always to look for joy in the scriptures, the word of God that is the source of all that is good for us. And can we find it there? We can, and as we do so, we may wish to notice that today, December 17th, is the day when the Church enters the deeper, second, period of Advent, with the "Great O" Antiphons; so this is the time to go more deeply into the reality of the feast that is coming, though of course it has not yet arrived, and will not do so until we come to next Sunday evening, when we shall start our Christmas celebration. By then we hope to have entered more profoundly into the identity of the one whose birth we are about to celebrate. And what might today's readings have to tell us about this person?

Certainly, Jesus himself seems to have made the connection, for the first reading is quoted by him in what Luke offers us as the beginning of his preaching, in the synagogue at Nazara, "where he had been brought up". He recites these lines, and then preaches a sermon on them, the shortest in history: "Today this Scripture is fulfilled in your ears." Then the reading ends, with immense joy, possibly one of the sources of Mary's beautiful Christmas hymn, the "Magnificat": "I rejoice greatly in the Lord; in my God is the joy of my soul", and the poet imagines what Jerusalem is going to be wearing when the Lord comes: "like a bridegroom adorned with a diadem, like a bride bedecked with her jewels". Then we are invited to imagine what the Lord's new world will look like: "as the earth brings forth its plants and a garden makes its growth spring up, so will the Lord God make justice and praise spring up before all the nations." There is unmistakable joy here, as indeed there is in today's responsorial, which is precisely that "Magnificat".

And of course, there is immense joy in today's second reading, which is from the very first

document in the entire New Testament, where we hear Paul telling his Thessalonians to "rejoice all the time...give thanks in every respect". And then he offers us the grounds for this rejoicing: "you see – this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for all of you". Do you see how our rejoicing comes from knowing who Jesus is?

And that is what today's gospel brings us, part of the extraordinary opening chapter of John's gospel. It starts with a glimpse of John the Baptist, but it is carefully organised to make it clear that what matters here is not John but Jesus, for it is Jesus, not John, whose function is to "bear witness to the light", and indeed actually to be the Light. Then we go deeper into who Jesus is, and who John is: John makes it utterly clear that "I am NOT the Christ", nor "the Prophet"; instead, he points to the person who really matters at this time, and that is, of course, Jesus, of whom the Baptist says "I am not fit to undo the thong of his sandal" (which would of course be a slave's job). So that is where our joy lies at this time, identifying who Jesus is, and also recognising that we are not God.

Could you manage that, this Christmas time?

ADVENT SYNOD ARTICLE

Synod: December 11, 2023

This is a time when we would hope to be focused on preparing for a joyful and important birthday party near the end of the month. And yet, at the same time, it's impossible to ignore the seeming crescendo of worldwide suffering, especially the savage, intractable wars, caused by mankind, seemingly without any reasonable hope of solution. One wonders, in spite of notable advances in civilization, whether we have really made any progress over centuries or millenia, whether there is any real hope for the future.

One can ask, "How does a good Christian deal with this state of affairs, where there seems so little cause for hope and such great cause for despair." The bible is full of hints and messages: Jesus's parables contain repeated calls to action to show up to do the work of the Lord, to act as a neighbor to our neighbors; the New Testament directs us to follow up faith with deeds; and, when actual action seems absurdly ineffective or irrelevant, to bear our troubles with patience and enduring fortitude, following the example of Christ. The Synod process is a recognition that all of this is most possible, and perhaps only possible, if we all actively try to do together what our Church was founded for, to answer Christ's call to faith and action.

The Synod purpose, as I understand it, is to include as many people as possible in conversation as to the mission and processes of the Church, to draw in those seemingly outside the tent, also engaging all those inside the tent. In the Synod meetings I've attended, we've had the chance to share our experiences and views, spiritual needs and aspirations, a valuable, empowering, and satisfying experience.

Pope Francis has given us the opportunity and the incentive to participate in the life of the Church. The chance is there for us to work to help heal the wounds of the world. For it to work, the Synod process needs the participation of as many of us as possible.
