Introduction

Responding to a recommendation by a regular film club supoprter, the film this month is 'Ida', a 2013 foreign language drama, written and directed by Pawel Pawlikoswki. The film was voted Best Film by the European Film Academy in 2014, Best Non-English Film by BAFTA in 2014 and Best Foreign Language Film at the 2015 Academy Awards. Quite a pedigree. Set in Poland in 1962, it follows a young woman on the verge of taking vows as a Catholic nun. Orphaned as an infant during the German occupation of World War II, she must meet her aunt, a former Communist state prosecutor and only surviving relative, who tells her that her parents were Jewish. The two women embark on a road trip into the Polish countryside to learn the fate of their relatives.

Hailed as a 'compact masterpiece; and an 'eerily beautiful road movie, the film has also been said to 'contain a cosmos of guilt, violence and pain'. Buckle up for a bumpy ride!

SYNOD SUNDAY SUMMARY

We stand before you, Holy Spirit, as we gather in Your name.

These words are the beginning of the Synod prayer, said daily at the meeting of Synod representatives in Rome in October 2023.

Pope Francis announced the Synod on Synodality in October 2021 with the aim of hearing from the Church across the world. This process of listening to one another, without seeking consensus and agreement, was designed to give people at every level a chance to share their longings and dreams for the future of the Church.

At the beginning of this journey, we did not know where it would lead us. Already for those who have participated in the process, there has been a shift in culture. We have experienced that in listening without debate our relationships with one another can grow and deepen.

The meeting in Rome was the first of its kind, where the Pope, Cardinals, Bishops, clergy, laity, men and women, came together around tables to share and listen to one another and to the themes that had come in from around the world.

Last Sunday we had a Synod meeting in the Arrupe Hall after each Mass, standing together before the Holy Spirit and listening to one another as we reflected on the themes that came out of the month-long meeting of Synod representatives.

To facilitate the discussion at this stage, the bishops locally asked us to think about co-responsibility - mission and participation - and formation. These meetings were an opportunity for people to ask questions about what this could look like and to consider how local structures in our own church could change to accommodate that.

We heard that parishioners have appreciated listening and being listened to over the last two years, and that some of us long for concrete decisions. We know that any change impacts each person differently, but we hear a deep hope that, however our life as Church continues, we want to remain united in our faith, community, prayer and worship.

There were concerns that much more could be provided for children and young people, especially the age group 16 to 25.

Some initiatives such as half of the reading rota at the family mass being given to children, supported by a young adult, have already started; others are planned, such as the launch of a child friendly space in the St Ignatius chapel for use during Mass. However, there are unmet needs and no obvious spaces for community and faith sharing amongst people in their late teens and early twenties.

Some people were clear how much they valued the formation and catechesis that had been part of their journey as Catholics and said they would like more opportunities to study the Bible, learn about the faith, and encourage each other in different ways of praying.

Some people knew about the programs that are well established at Farm Street, such as RCIA and Landings, and wondered if this model could be used for ongoing formation, learning and faith sharing. The use of digital platforms for prayer, study, learning and evangelization could be developed further, something which Pope Francis has acknowledged.

Some people voiced their frustration that the process of change in the wider Church is slow. For example, many people highlighted a desire for increased rôles for women, particularly opportunities for their voices to be heard, such as in preaching, the diaconate, or even the priesthood. This has been discussed for a long time.

At the same time, there was acknowledgement that Farm Street already gives some space for women's leadership.

The welcoming of LGBT Catholics Westminster is valued by many, although there is some frustration that LGBT people were not specifically mentioned in the Synthesis document from Rome 2023.

Importance was given to holding onto the universal beliefs and values of our faith, and many expressed the hope that these will strengthen Church unity.

There is much to do to rebuild and maintain trust in the Church after many betrayals, and we heard a longing to be involved in that rebuilding. Some people spoke of their concern about the hurt that the Church has caused with the abuse scandal and the way it has been handled.

Many spoke of their need for community and social activities as a way of encouraging each other in the faith, and there were practical suggestions about how we could witness our faith to others outside the Church by more openness about being Catholics.

Whilst none of us know what is going to emerge from the conclusion of this phase of the Synod, we are all called to trust the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit today and into the future. More information about the Synod is available on the parish website.

The Synodal process is teaching us to listen in new ways - let's continue the conversations!

Peter's Way of the Cross

We are excited to announce that we will be hosting a performance of *Peter's Way of the Cross* at Farm Street Church on the evening of **Friday March**22nd at 7pm preceded by Mass at 6pm. Peter's Way of the Cross is a 60-minute reflection which imagines St. Peter following the path of Jesus on his way to Calvary whilst reflecting on his journey as a disciple and as a witness to Christ's teachings. Peter begins his journey confused by the events of Gethsemane, the trial and is distressed and ashamed by his denial. At each station, the scene is described, and Peter reflects on Christ's teaching or actions from the three years of ministry. In each case the gospel passage used has been set to music.

The words were written by Bernard Lavery KSG and the music composed by Giovanni Marseglia BM. The work has been performed in Westminster Cathedral, Killarney Cathedral, The Old Bailey and many parishes in the diocese. It was also used as the centrepiece of an evening celebration during the 2017 Westminster Diocese Pilgrimage to Lourdes and was enthusiastically received.

This event is free and does not require booking.
