A VISIT TO THE HOLY LAND

Recently, as some of you are aware, I was lately in the Holy Land; this was as spiritual director to a pilgrimage from the Diocese of Clifton. With one thing and another in recent years it had been some while since I was there, but it still worked its old familiar magic. We started in Bethlehem; that surprised me a little, but it worked remarkably well, for it brought us into contact with the reality of the lives of Palestinians, especially Palestinian Christians who are decreasing in number all the time, though they remain impressively faithful. We were able to glimpse them as they made the difficult way through the checkpoints that separate the West Bank from Israel; it might have been better if we ourselves had endured some of the interrogation that goes on there, but still we got an idea of what was happening, and we were also taken to a Palestinian village on the edge of Bethlehem, and visited the "House of Joy", an impressive school for children with learning difficulties. We also visited the admirable "House of Martha", a wonderful refuge for older women, where they can be fed and washed (and even do some lively dancing!) though it is not possible for them to live there. That experience set the context for the rest of our time in the country. We did all the usual Bethlehem things, the "Shepherds' Fields" in Beit Sahour, the Basilica of the Nativity (of course), as well as St Catherine's Church. It seemed to this observer that things were less tense between the various Christian denominations than used to be the case.

After that it was Jerusalem, and pleasant lodgings in the Latin Quarter. We had an excellent guide, himself a Palestinian Christian, and absolutely on top of the biblical material as well as on the history of the sites that we visited. There was a memorable visit to the basilica of the Holy Sepulchre: Golgotha and the long queue to get into the "Edicule", the site of Jesus' tomb, not to mention the lovely chapel of St Helena. Some of us went on two evenings to the Western Wall, and were very moved by the prayerful atmosphere. Perhaps the most unforgettable expedition was the one that took us from the Mosque of the Ascension, all the way down the Mount of Olives to the unforgettable Garden of Gethsemane. On the way, as many of you will recall, we take in the Church of the Pater Noster, where the Lord's Prayer can be found in hundreds of languages. Then we continued our slightly uncertain progress to that lovely church of the Dominus Flevit, recalling Jesus' tears over Jerusalem, where we had mass, the pilgrims able to gaze at the breathtaking view of the Dome of the Rock, over the "hen and chickens" altar through that extraordinary window. We walked the Old City,

as one must, although some found it quite hard work. Part of the group did a fairly rapid Stations of the Cross, which in some ways must have echoed Jesus' experience. On our final afternoon there we did "Mt Zion", which is now of course largely outside the City Walls, including the Church of Peter in Gallicantu, quite beautifully restored; alas the church of the Dormition will be closed for refurbishment for a few more years. But it was still a good way to end.

Then we turned North to Nazareth and Galilee, for the last part of our pilgrimage. We visited all the usual places, and discovered that we had during these days gone deeper into the mystery of this very Holy Land, and not forgotten those suffering Palestinians. We had a splendid visit to Caesarea Maritima, where Herod built some unforgettable buildings, where Paul was imprisoned for two years and where the great scholar Eusebius was bishop. We also had mass at the restored Magdala, gazing out over the Sea of Galilee. In addition, we went, as you must go, to Capharnaum, Tabgha, and of course the beautiful Church of the Beatitudes.

It was, take it all in all, a remarkable pilgrimage. And it came beautifully together on the. last afternoon when we had a boat on the sea of Galilee; at a certain point the crew switched off the engine, and we drifted silently, reflecting on what we had been through during these days, and what they had done for us. It was a remarkable pilgrimage. Then the next morning we left our hotel in Tiberias at 1:30am. I was back here in my office by 11:00am. We live in a very different world.
