This important film tells the true story of Lucia Cerna, a woman who witnessed the assassination of six Jesuits, their cook, and a teenage girl, by the Salvadorian army in 1989. The murders took place on the campus of the Central American University and shocked the world. Lucia, who worked as the Jesuits' housekeeper, was the only eyewitness and the film is based on her account of what happened.

After the massacre, Lucia fled the country and made her way to Miami under the protection of the Jesuits, where she was pressured into changing her story by the FBI. She never did. Of the nine men accused of the murders, only two were ever convicted. Jesuits in El Salvador continue to campaign for all the facts to come to light and continue to call for all those responsible to be brought to justice.

Fr Damian Howard SJ, Jesuit Provincial Superior said: 'This powerful film transports you back to the world of the 1980s and shows what a radical following of the Gospel looks like in a context of injustice and oppression. Lucia's story makes us ask ourselves what it means to follow Christ with equal commitment and generosity in the very different world we live in today.'

SEASON OF MISTS AND MELLOW FRUITFULNESS

It is the month of November; across the road in Hyde Park, the trees are just past that point of their richest colouring, the falling of the leaves gathers pace, and we seem beset by death. The month started with All Saints and All Souls, with their hint of death. And today we remember those who were slaughtered in the appalling wars of the 20th (and, for that matter, 21st) Centuries. It is also (have you noticed?) a month when, at least in our Northern Hemisphere, the death rate seems to rise. Indeed, I have already celebrated the funerals of two old friends, in the last week or so; and no doubt there will be more to come.

What are we to say to all this? Is Death ultimately victorious? It sometimes seems so; and of course, we must take seriously the finality of Death. The nights are getting longer and colder, and there are moments when it feels as though there is no escape from Death's bleak hand.

On the other hand, that is not quite the whole story, is it? Next month we shall have the winter solstice, and, then, imperceptibly at first, but surely, the light starts to win out over the darkness, and we watch, often with some relief, the days getting lighter and brighter.

"All well and good", you may say, "but then it won't be long before the summer solstice is upon us, and the days are once more getting darker; you can never beat the darkness". However, there is something else here, something more profound. And that is that Resurrection is right at the heart of the Christian faith; it is our deepest belief that "God raised Jesus from the dead", which was the earliest creed of our ancestors in faith, back in that first century. St Paul (look at the 15th chapter of his first letter to the Corinthians) is certain that if there is no Resurrection then there is no such thing as Christianity.

Every single one of the wide range of "books" (27 of them) that make up our New Testament each in its own way affirms its belief in Resurrection. None of the gospels makes any sense at all if Jesus has not been raised from the dead; and we should notice that in their quite different ways they are each absolutely clear about the reality of Jesus' death. Indeed, in all four of them, the biggest single section is the number of pages devoted to the account of the last few days of Jesus' life. So we are obliged to take death very seriously indeed, including the death of Jesus. But death, Christianity asserts, is not the end of the story, because God is in the story, both the story of Jesus and our own individual stories. And that includes, of course, the stories of the dead whom we remember in this dying month of the year.

So it is good to notice the present darkening of the days, but also to recognise that with astonishing rapidity we shall see those first hints of Spring (if you know where to look) that assure us that death is not the end. What then of the menace to the environment that comes from our selfish exploitation of the resources that God has lavished upon us? We must not, at our peril, blind ourselves to the urgency of the threat to our world, and we have the responsibility to do whatever we have it in us to do, whatever God has given us to contribute as our tiny gift to the world. There are things that we can still do, and it is our task to do them.

So this November is indeed a dark month, but it is not without those occasional streaks of light, and glimpses of the sun, that remind us that God is there, and that the light has not gone forever. The news is good...
