# THE PARABLE OF THE TALENTS

On the last three Sundays of November, we hear in our Sunday gospels Jesus speaking in parables. This is nothing new; we have heard many parables over recent weeks. What is different is that these final parables are addressed to his disciples rather than to his critics. Jesus is now giving his speech of farewell to them before his passion. This "last will and testament" is directed to all who hear this gospel, not only a Christian community at the end of the first century but to us who live in the period between the resurrection of Jesus and his final return.

In the "parable of the talents" (Matthew 25:14-30), Jesus tells of a man going abroad who gives various numbers of talents to his servants. The word "talent" refers to the amount of money a labourer would have earned after fifteen years. We may remember another parable about a man who owed the impossible sum of ten thousand talents (Matthew 18:24). Three servants are given different sums according to their competence. Two take the money and make as much again, while the third hides his and makes nothing. If the parable stopped here, we could admire the care shown for property. There is no irresponsible behaviour here, like that of the servant in another parable who "sets about beating his fellow servants and eating and drinking with drunkards" (Matthew 24: 49).

The story continues with a shock. The servant who seemed so prudent in keeping his talent safe is condemned as wicked and lazy. A first reaction might be that he is being treated unfairly, like the labourers in the vineyard who worked all day in the heat (Matthew 20:1–16). His excuse corrects this first impression when we learn how unfair he is to his master. He accuses him of being a hard man, reaping where he has not sown. How could a hard man have given out such enormous sums of money at such a risk? Like the labourers in the vineyard and the steward who refused to forgive his debtor (Matthew 18:23–35), here is another character who thought he knew what God was like and how God ought to act.

The two others are rewarded, because, entrusted with property, they use it to earn more. They put their resources to work, like the disciples with the loaves and the fishes at the feeding of the five thousand (Matthew 14:16–17). This is how Christians are to spend the time of waiting. This story of the talents has nothing to do with business practice or commerce. These are not Matthaean interests. The parable is a call to us to take the ethical and religious message of this Gospel seriously; we are not to keep it secret, as if hiding it in a hole in the ground, but we are to seek a righteousness exceeding that of the scribes and Pharisees, to do the will of the Father, to bear fruit in the life of the Kingdom (Matthew 5:20; 7:21; 13:23).
