AN EASTER MESSAGE FOR **EASTER SUNDAY**

Dear brothers and sisters,

May I wish you, on behalf of the Jesuit community and whole Farm Street Team, a very blessed Easter which brings you and your loved ones hope in these troubled times.

At Easter last year we were just at the start of this national crisis. In this message then I invited our readers to follow Pope Francis' lead. Pope was already encouraging us to do some collective soul searching as society, to listen to what the tragedy of the pandemic was teaching us about the future. And, as the year has passed, he has continued to challenge us not simply to go back to a 'new normal' but to seek to create a better post-pandemic world. I have been especially inspired by Francis in this last year, finding in his letter Fratelli tutti and series of interviews Let us Dream much consolation, and would highly recommend them to anyone who is trying to make sense of what it is to be a Christian in a churned up world emerging from the pandemic.

Looking forward with hope must always be the message of Easter but that will be easier said than truly lived. These last twelve months have been hard for most everyone. It is fully understandable if we seem lost now and not ready for Easter at all. In a way the life of the Parish has mirrored the life of the Church and society as a whole. We have been in this together, many suffering family bereavement and sickness, many among our own parishioners coping with loneliness, many losing jobs and livelihoods, the vast numbers around our city plunging into poverty. Yet there has also been great generosity as we have drawn nearly 100 volunteers over the last year to care for the homeless. So much has been done online and this has shown that large numbers of people, perhaps thinking of faith for the first time or seeking to return to the Church, have been knocking at our virtual door. So for me there is much to hope for as our parish community has not shrunk through lack of presence in church but has expanded and taken a different shape. As we begin to live life more fully again, when we can be really present to each other again, I see there is much to hope for as we discern how we bring the risen Christ to the world in what may indeed eventually look like the new era Pope Francis is inviting us to embrace.

Pope Francis says that for the Christian we must not iust hope in new life but discern how to create it. We have, says the Pope, been seeing glimmers of this as

humanity realises how we are all in it together. We are all interconnected with each other and with the planet. As we celebrate again the resurrection, that is what lies right at the heart of our faith, may we know the risen Christ's cosmic power and our call to rebuild. Easter is always a new dawn. This year that call to start afresh will have special meaning.

May we be filled this Easter with the gift of hope in the risen Christ so we may build a more human future for our world emerging from time of crisis and being called again today to new life.

Cardinal Sandri, Prefect of the Congregation for the Oriental Churches, has written a letter to all bishops regarding this year's Holy Places Collection which is to be taken on Good Friday in all churches in England and Wales (and worldwide). A report from the Congregation regarding the support given to the Christian Communities in the Middle East is also included in the attachment to the letter. The Diocese of Westminster has expressed concern that many people may be unfamiliar with the scope and extent of the work supported by the Good Friday collection, and so we are publishing the Cardinal's letter on our website for all to read. Act of Perfect Contrition

Face Covering Update

'Face coverings will be mandatory in Places of Worship from Saturday 8th August 2020. All those who are attending churches must wear a face covering unless they are exempt from doing so. This is for the good of all who gather in the Church for Mass [or for private prayer] as it is an enclosed public space where there are people from differing households who they do not normally meet.'
