# Society of Jesus calls for the name of Fr Stan Swamy SJ to be cleared

Fr Stan Swamy SJ, spent five decades fighting for Indigenous rights in the Indian state of Jharkhand. He died of Covid-19 in July 2021, after spending seven months in an Indian prison. He was imprisoned under the archaic Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA) for crimes against the government of India and his supposed involvement in violence surrounding the 2018 Bhima Koregaon protests. Fr Swamy was 83 at the time of his arrest and imprisonment. He was the oldest of the those arrested at the time, most of whom are still in prison.

During the seven months of his detention requests for bail were repeatedly denied, despite his deteriorating health. Fr Stan, who suffered from Parkinson's Disease, reportedly became unable to feed and bathe himself. Prison authorities also reportedly denied him basic amenities, such as a straw and a sipper, to help with his Parkinson's. While in prison he contracted COVID 19. He died on 5<sup>th</sup> July 2020, while still in police custody.

In December 2022, Massachusetts-based digital forensics firm Arsenal Consulting reported the results of its investigation into the evidence which had led to Fr Swamy's arrest and imprisonment. The report concluded that the priest was systematically targeted in a cyber campaign over a four-year period during which time false evidence was planted on his computer.

Fr Stan's willingness to stand with the poor and excluded eventually cost him his life. Today, an international campaign launched by the Society of Jesus in Jarkhand is seeking to clear Fr Swamy's name by asking people around the world to stand in solidarity with Stan by signing petitions which call on the Indian government to clear the name of this innocent man, based on the new evidence.

Here in the United Kingdom Jesuit Missions is spearheading this effort and the UK petition has already garnered over 5000 signatures. If you have not already signed the petition, could we please ask you to do so. Do share this information in parishes and Jesuit works. To make an impact 10,000 signatures are needed.

In anticipation of the anniversary of Fr Swamy's death Jesuit Missions is also planning a vigil which will take place on the morning of Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> June in Central London. As part of their continued efforts, they are also working to draw the attention of politicians here in the UK to this injustice. We encourage as many as possible to join us on the 20<sup>th</sup>. More information to follow.

Catholic Listeners is a confidential telephone helpline service. A Diocese of Westminster initiative, it has been set up for those who are returning to the faith. The helpline is all about listening to others, listening to those who might have become isolated due to the pandemic. This service is based on the Landings ethos of compassionate listening. Although not a counselling service, the helpline is staffed by a professional team of volunteers who are trained to signpost callers to other services and agencies. Sometimes just communicating with someone who listens and understands can help clarify a way forward. Simply talking about a problem can ease a burden. We aim to help those in need of a safe space to talk.

# **GOD IS LOVE**

The Rev Peter Gomes was a famous preacher in the United States. He died in 2011 and for an astonishing 40 years preached every week in the Memorial Church of Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Not so long ago, I read a sermon he gave one Trinity Sunday, a Sunday devoted to the central doctrine of the Christian Faith. We say God is triune, three and one: the Father is God, the Son is God, and the Holy Spirit is God and yet God is one.

He says it's only right we have a Sunday dedicated to the Trinity because it reminds us that our Christian faith is not only stories about Jesus nor a set of moral principles, nor a cultural or aesthetic experience but also a body of beliefs which places us in continuity with the very first Christians. No, our faith is not only about how we act or how we feel; it also encourages us, even forces us, to think.

In other words, a doctrine like this gets us to ask questions, "How can we make sense of our belief in the Trinity? What exactly is it we celebrate today?"

One of the stories about Jesus which I find I think about often, and which I hope in some way inspires me, comes at the beginning of St John's account of the Last Supper. You will remember how John says that Jesus took of his outer garment, wrapped a towel around his waist and then washed, on by one, the feet of his disciples.

As we know, this was the job given in Jewish households to the lowest of servants, to slaves. Feet were dirty: they were mucky. This was far from being a pleasant job. But this is the work Jesus did for his disciples. That he should do this took them aback, astonished them. You'll remember how Peter said to Jesus, "You will never do this for me!" Then, despite protests, having washed the feet of the disciples, Jesus then says to them, "I have given you an example that you should do likewise".

During my Jesuit life and my life as a priest, I have been fortunate to come across so many examples, men and women almost too many to count, who have followed Jesus' example and done likewise. I am sure you have too.

As a very young man, I worked at St Christopher's Hospice in Sydenham and there met Dame Cicely Saunders whose life work it was to found these hospices for the terminally sick. These places which may have taken care of members of your family in the last weeks of their lives.

I think as well of those who work with the Jesuit refugee service in war-torn Syria; those who care for the homeless; those who provide beds and furniture for those without the means to furnish their flats. I think of those I know in Pakistan, who have given their whole lives to help promote, through education, humane values in society, values which prove attractive to families of many religions.

My list goes on and on and I'm sure you could draw up one too. "I have given you an example that you should do likewise".

Why, you might ask, is he telling us this today, on Trinity Sunday? It's because, as St John says in one of his letters, "God is love". So, the Holy Trinity is all about love.

Because Jesus is the Son of God, his words and actions tell us exactly what God is like. So, when he washed the feet of his disciples, he was telling us and showing us that this is what God is like: God is love, a servant kind of love, a self-emptying kind of love, a self-giving kind of love that even does the dirtiest of jobs, the work of the slave, and all for us. That's the love with which the Father loves him, and that's the love with which Jesus loves us.

But do we also say the Holy Spirit is God? The Holy Spirit teaches us about this love, moves us to grasp and appreciate this love. Above the Spirit prompts that same love in us, such that the self-emptying, self-giving love of God comes alive not 2,000 years ago but on the streets of London today.

For me, Trinity Sunday is all about celebrating the love of the Father, shown to us by the Son and prompted in us by the Holy Spirit: a triune love, one love from the Father, through the Son and in the Spirit; a love which takes off its outer garment, kneels down and washes the feet of our brothers and siters. Such is the love of God for you and for me and for us all, this is the God of love we celebrate today: amazing!
