THE BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

The COVID pandemic interrupted so much in our lives. Work, school, and family patterns. Sickness, death, grief. Our churches being locked, Mass moving online. In the midst of this I think there emerges a spirit of service to those most in need, a new deeper reflection on human dignity, in spirituality, on faith in action. The Eucharist became in a sense more important as it forced us to think of what the Eucharist was all about. One effect of the pandemic was also to turn people too much in on themselves and interrupt community but we are now emerging clearly from that, and I hope learning from the experience of the pandemic, including in our celebration of Mass as the place above all as a community we learn to put faith put into action.

Online worship is now seen as a vital part of evangelisation because, when done well, it is designed not to keep people away but to draw more into and back to the Church. I encounter stories of this all the time as those who start participating online find their way into the church building and community in person, and so am heartened to expand still further our online facilities and reach. The Eucharist is never just a private devotion, whether online or in person. Make no mistake. It is the place in our lives par excellence where we hear the call to transcend ourselves. That's why we encourage again now as before COVID, to exchange a sign of peace before receiving Holy Communion, why we give audible responses, why we encourage active participation and understanding of words and actions. For what we do in the Mass prepares us for what the Mass is all about: 'Go in peace, glorifying the Lord with our lives'. Being Christ to the world. It expresses our Christian vocation to love as Christ loved.

Each time we approach the altar to receive Holy Communion we say yes to this and so say yes to our Christian calling. That's why we are invited to prepare well to receive his body and blood, to do so with reverence and understanding of this great gift, and to give thanks for that gift afterwards in silent prayer. Each time we say "amen" to his body and his blood we are reminded of our common duty to serve Him. And that is why also, now COVID restrictions are fully and safely lifted, we have been inviting you also, since Maundy Thursday, as a symbol of what it is all about, to receive from the chalice the precious blood of Christ. It is an invitation and not an obligation, as we understand some may feel uncomfortable, but it is an invitation we take seriously because it expresses who we are. Sent to proclaim our faith in his blood shed for us on the cross.

The Church of course teaches that 'nothing is lost by the body being received by the people without the blood: because the priest both offers and receives the blood in the name of all, and the whole Christ is present under either species' (Summa Theologiae, III, q. 80, a. 12, ad 3). Under the species of bread there is also present substantially, fully, the precious blood. This is our faith. So, the purpose of receiving Holy Communion under both kinds is not that we receive more grace than when we receive it under one kind alone, but, as the recent Church document Redemptionis Sacramentum puts it, that we are enabled to appreciate vividly the value of the sign. And that sign is important because we are a people who recognise in signs and gestures what our faith spurs us on to. The Precious Blood of Christ, truly present under the appearance of wine, is just such a sign, which, as the body broken for us shows us, invites us to embrace the mystery of the cross, of Jesus' sacrificial love for us, and our calling to love as he did in giving ourselves in total generosity for

As we emerge into a sometimes confusing but exciting post-pandemic world I pray that our faith in the weekly, daily, celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, confirms our faith in his presence among us and impels us to live out that faith in the world with a new integrity marked by the power of his sacrificial love.

One Day Workshop at the London Jesuit Centre

Take a fascinating look at different ways people have suggested that 'Salvation' works.

Course overview

In one of the earliest writings in the New Testament, the Apostle Paul wrote: "For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures...". But the question of what it means to say that "Christ died for sins"—the question of atonement theology—has been answered in many different ways throughout Christian history, and is particularly controversial within recent theology. This course explores some of these differences, and asks what this little word "for" might mean. How can one man's death be "for" anyone else, let alone all humanity? What are we saying, when we say that "Christ died for sins?"
