## **CREATED IN THE IMAGE OF GOD**

I am a governor in a large Catholic comprehensive school in north London. In late January, I and another governor spent a day visiting the chaplaincy and the religious education department.

We met with the school's lay chaplain and the head of religious education. We discussed the curriculum, the time allotted to the teaching of RE and the funds available to the department for resources. We considered how the school goes about organising opportunities for prayer, collective worship, its days of reflection and retreats. We met students and sat in on RE classes. We were very impressed by what we saw and heard.

One theme the students engaged with was the "Imago Dei": the Judaeo-Christian belief that each and every human person is, as we read in the first chapter of the Book of Genesis, created in the image of God.

"Created in the image of God" conveys the extraordinary truth that human persons are created in order to enjoy personal communion with the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and with one another in them.

Created in the image of God, each and every human life is sacred. This is the principle in terms of which we are not only to judge our personal morality, how we relate to ourselves and each other, but the morality of public policy too. In this way, the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. No human life can be instrumentalised, become a means to another end. To act in this way or to cause others to act in this way is wrong and sure to fail

Writing about the importance of conserving all of God's creation, Pope Francis reminds us that each creature has its own purpose. None is superfluous. The entire material universe speaks of God's love. This is still more true of each human person, created as he or she is, in the image of God.

Some people, among them poets and mystics, are blessed with a deep sense of the sacredness of each human life. How much we all need to develop, and help others develop, a capacity to recognise the image of God in every human person.

I have been reminded often these past days of the classes which I and my colleague visited and the explanation I heard being given about how each human person is created in the "Imago Dei". There has been a good deal in the news about the government's proposed legislation to deter illegal migration and the measures they propose to take, which some are calling draconian. Those who fail to use the proper immigration channels would be promptly deported and, once deported, they will not be able to apply for asylum in the UK in the future.

"The foreigners residing among you must be treated as native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God.", we read in the Book of Leviticus. (19:34) "Love one another as I have loved you", commands Jesus in John's Gospel (13:34)

Each and every person demands our respect and refugees and migrants are no exception. This means we need to listen to them, to meet their needs, to appreciate their beauty, to feel their pain, to stand up for them when they are unjustly treated, to ensure they have adequate food, shelter and healthcare and to educate their children.

All of which explains why I'm in admiration of the work of the Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) in this country and proud to be associated with it. I admire the welcome refugee friends receive in the JRS centre in east London, the legal assistance they are given with their asylum claims, the lengths to which JRS goes to help provide them with food and shelter, and the accompaniment they are offered in the detention centres.

As followers of Jesus, we have a duty to promote the welfare of each person, especially those who have no voice for themselves, and to stand up when we think that welfare is being threatened. As inheritors of that Judaeo-Christian tradition that regards all human life as created in the image of God and sacred, we also have a duty to promote this tradition, as this school I visited is doing, and to ensure this tradition continues to nourish values, to inform policy and to challenge standards of behaviour in both private and public life.

Forgetting this tradition which underpins many of the values which many of us value most, be we Jews or Christians or of other faiths or none, risks doing much damage to ourselves and to the quality of the life which we live together in society. Some might say that damage is already being done.

Father, you entrusted to Saint Joseph what you held most precious: the child Jesus and his Mother, in order to protect them from the dangers and threats of the wicked.

Grant that we may experience his protection and help.

May he, who shared in the sufferings of those who flee from the hatred of the powerful,

console and protect all our brothers and sisters driven by war, poverty and necessity to leave their homes and their lands to set out as refugees for safer places.

We make this prayer through Christ our Lord. Pope Francis, 2020
